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Formerly Of P. E. I. Dies In Edmonton

A well known resident of Edmonton for 20 years and a former Islander, Angus Joseph MacCormack, died in Vancouver recently.

Mr. MacCormack was born in Monticello, P. E. I. in 1870, and went west in 1895, settling in Lethbridge, where he was with A. MacDonald Co. until 1900.

He then went to Battleford, Sask., where, until 1925, he was manager of Prince Bros. Ltd. He went to Edmonton in 1925 and joined the Coal Valley Mine, where he was secretary treasurer until retiring in 1945.

Mr. MacCormack was an honorary life member of the Edmonton council, Knights of Columbus, and the Northern Alberta Pioneers and Old Timers Association. He was on the executive council of the Canadian Catholic Historical Association, and the provincial Liberal Association.

He was a native member of the Canadian Club and the Maritimes Association, and in 1937 served as president of the Edmonton Highland Games Association.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. J. Shannon of Edmonton; Genevieve and Mrs. R. M. Smith of Vancouver; two sisters, Mrs. F. McIntyre of Hudson, Mass., and Mrs. Eva Paquette of Montreal. Eight grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held in Edmonton in St. Anthony's Church, with Rev. C. J. Foran officiating. Prayers were held at Connelly-McKinley Funeral Chapel and members of the Knights of Columbus also held prayers there. Bural was in the South Edmonton Roman Catholic Cemetery.

BORN THIRTY YEARS TOO SOON

Jury Finds Death Due To Exposure

The inquest into the death of Mr. Lester (Chuck) MacLeod, who was found dead in a snow drift on Monday afternoon, March 3 on the Mill Road near Murray River, was continued yesterday afternoon before Mr. Alexander Durney, J.P.

Following the evidence of two witnesses the jury retired for fifteen minutes to bring in a verdict of death by exposure to the elements.

At the inquest held on March 3, evidence was given by Mr. Cyrus MacLeod, who discovered the body, Mr. Glen MacKinnon, Mr. Fred Acorn, Mr. Jack MacLeod, and Dr. M. L. Bonnell.

In his evidence Jack MacLeod stated that when the deceased left his home he was heading in the direction of the Mill Road. Yesterday Foster Jenkins took up the story from there, stating that Mr. MacLeod had arrived at his home at 12.30 wishing to have a rest. The witness stated that Mr. MacLeod was partly intoxicated, and asked for a glass into which he poured the contents from a small clear bottle which he had removed from his pocket. He remained there, the witness said, until approximately 1 p.m. when he left following the Mill Road.

Mr. Jenkins said that he could see Mr. MacLeod walking along the road at some distance from his home.

Dr. M. L. Bonnell was called to the stand to give the report of the findings of the provincial pathologist on the specimens of the post mortem sent in last week. The report stated that there was approximately 3 mgm per C.C. of alcohol in the stomach and 2.5 mgm per C.C. in the blood. Dr. Bonnell then explained these findings stating that a 2 mgm per C.C. has very serious effects on the metabolism and muscular co-ordination, and could result in paralysis. It would seem evident, he said, that the deceased had collapsed in the snow and was unable to arise. Dr. Bonnell went on to point out that the body would tend to lose its heat rapidly while lying on the snow, and when the body temperature reached 70 degrees or less, heart action would cease.

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Several Roads In King's Still Blocked

At least two-thirds of the roads of King's County are still impassable to traffic as a result of last week's storm, Mr. George Saville, M.L.A., for Fifth King's, stated yesterday.

Mr. Saville arrived yesterday by train to attend the opening Legislature sessions which commence in this city today.

Included in those still unopened were the road from Dundas to Cardigan and the Seven Mile Road which runs from Murray Harbor North to Gasperaux.

It was stated that the Department of Highways was making an all-out effort to clear main roads and that all available plows were working steadily in an attempt to alleviate the present condition. It was expected that several of the roads would be cleared by late last night.

It was further stated that the road leading from Dundas to Souris by way of Annadale had been opened for traffic late Saturday night.

Six stores and seven churches between Lower Montague and Peake's Town via Sturgeon and Gasperaux have been isolated for several days due to the last severe snow storm.

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
