HUNTER'S CORNER

Trout Season View Mixed; Ruffed Grouse Hit Record

October, with its hushed quiet and crimson and gold hardwoods, is with us once again. It is this month's favourite month although it is in reality a sad period as it speaks of a hushed quietude that awaits with bated breath the advent of King Winter. 'October's leaves their crimson tears let fall' is more truth than poetry. Memories of quiet strolls in the October hardwoods come to mind ... the rustle of crimson beauty underfoot ... a soft sunlight filtering through the coloured canopy overhead and the tick-tock of falling leaves filtering earthward through the trees to their last resting place. October is also the month of the Hunters' Moon ... at least it used to be. The trout season is over for another year and has left a mixed reaction in its wake. Many trout fishermen feel that the season should never have been extended to September 30th. The last two weeks of the Season an approximate 80 per cent of trout caught were females that were full of spawn. One angler told me that a week before the season closed he caught ten trout and eight of them were females. That's about the same story toward season's close ... at least four females to every male. The table quality of the female trout dropped off sharply during mid-September and their colouring had faded noticeably. This columnist would rather see the trout season open on April 1st and close on September 1st.

proper manner and kept in a secret hideaway. Skunk snouts were legal tender with the bootlegging fraternity but the clerks at the Liquor Store on Great George Street gazed at them in a stupefied way. On occasion he called upon this scribe to cash his script for him. Our Ruffed Grouse ... native partridge to most Island residents ... have hit an all time peak in numbers this season. They had an ideal fall-chasing year as late season snow storms and torrential rains were absent this spring. It was a real made to order hatching season for our top native upland game bird. Another native son ... the red fox ... has hit an all time high in numbers this year. They had no trouble feeding their families this spring as our swales and meadows fairly teem with mice. Their pellets are fetching good prices on the Fur Sales this year and, if fox hunters are really smart, they'll not run their hounds too early. An October red fox running wild gives the impression of sporting a top pelt ... until it is in the hand. It takes a November frost to put the gloss on their fur. Its not smart business to shoot a fox when its pelt will fetch a scant dollar and a quarter or maybe, one half when a few weeks will put it in the eight and nine dollar class. As an old fox hunter remarked to me a few days ago: "Its real sport when one has the thrill of the hunt to enjoy and ten or fifteen dollars thrown in for good measure".

There is no question about it but the skunks are getting set to take the province over. One morning this week a motorist of my acquaintance left the city at daybreak for Bordien and counted sixteen skunks on the highway that had been killed by cars during the previous night. A farmer at Marshfield makes frequent early morning trips to the city with milk and sees on an average two or three dead skunks on the highway ... the toll from cars during the night. Another car driver told me he saw eight skunks that had been killed by cars on a drive from Village Green to the City.

Young trappers, and trappers not so young made considerable pocket money trapping skunks for the bounty. One old time trapper kept himself supplied with liquid refreshment on skunk bounty. His better half kept a sharp eye on his embibing habits and commanded his pay roll every day and the vendors got none of it. A man who could outwit the craftiest for mink found a way out of his 'embibing trouble'. He harvested anywhere between sixty and eighty skunk snouts every year. These he sun cured in the

South African Golfers Hold Canada Cup Lead

MADRID (AP)—Gary Player, reigning United States open champion, and South African teammate Harold Henning had a one-stroke lead at the end of the first round Thursday of the

Canada Cup golf tournament. The Canadian team was four strokes back. Player and Henning totaled 140 at the start of the 72-hole tournament ending Sunday over the 7,096-yard, par 36-36-72 Club de Camp course on the outskirts of Madrid.

Thirty-seven teams are aiming at the championship over the last two years by Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer for the United States.

Five players besides Knudson were one shot behind in the individual race with two-under-par 70s—Player, Roberto de Vicenzo of Argentina, Nagle, Miguel J. Sala of Colombia and Sota.
