TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 17.

Winnipeg has been divided into two electoral divisions for the purpose of representation in the Local Legislature.

Pile driving for a bridge for temporary use at the Loxie Railway and traffic bridge over the Red River has been completed, and traffic is expected to be resumed into the city in ten days. Permanent construction of the bridge will be facilitated by means of the temporary structure.

The weather has been delightful, with genial showers, which has given an impulse to vegetation. Seeding operations are nearly completed, and the earlier sown cereals in the south and west are now above ground.

There is great excitement over the new Syndicate. At Brandon where the Pacific Railway crosses the Assiniboine, some one hundred and fifty miles west of Winnipeg, the survey is nearly completed and town lots will be on the market next week. Industrial enterprises are already begun and stores have been opened, as well as hotels under canvass.

OTTAWA, May 20.

Mr. Collingwood Schrieber, Chief Engineer of Government Railways, accompanied by Mr. Greenfield, his Secretary, leaves to-night for the East. He will make a thorough inspection of the Intercolonial and P. E. I. Railways.

TANAGER, N. S., May 20.

The steamer "Larnax," from Baltimore, in ballast, went ashore at Charles Island on Thursday night. No lives lost.

SYDNEY, May 20.

The barque "Marathon" was abandoned near the Banks of Newfoundland. The crew were taken off by the barque "Moira" and transferred to the steamer "Tuncall," Capt. Mackie, which brought them here.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LIMERICK, May 19.

A large force of military and police, proceeded under command Major Vandellon of the 9th regiment and Major Rolleston of Royal Marines to-day to New Pallas, County Limerick, to raid Sheriffs in evictions upon an estate. On the march a large body of people followed them, yelling, shouting, and pelting them with stones. Amid the shower of missiles the Sheriff succeeded after much difficulty in evicting a few families, then proceeded to a distant part of the estate, but the people had left their homes and taken possession of a large estate upon the estate, which had looted, holed and made unapproachable, that executing writs was abandoned for the day. Stones showered upon the police and the military, and so threatening was the aspect that Major Rolleston, ordered the police to lead their rifles, and military to fix bayonets and warned the people if they persisted in their conduct he would read the riot act, and if they did not disperse within a short time, he should feel it his duty to order the constabulary to fire and soldiers to charge. Warning had the desired effect and the people dispersed but not before Lewis Gowan, had received a blow from a cudgel. Four persons were arrested including Gowan's assailant.

To-morrow morning a flying column with four pieces of artillery will proceed with the sheriff to execute writs upon the people in castle.

LONDON, May 20.

Among the Irish members who voted for a second reading of the Land Bill were Wm. Shaw, Mitchell, Henry Davitt, J. Tauche, Colthurst, George Ervington, John Philip Nolan, P. J. Smyth, John O'Connor Power and Daniel O'Donoghue. Several Irish Conservative members refrained from voting.

The Times reported that troops near Bardo Palace are to be immediately reinforced, as it is stated that the Bey has asked protection, fearing an attack upon his person, owing to the increasing excitement.

LONDON, May 20.

The News says the passage in Archbishop Crooke's speech at Ballygarry, Saturday, in which he said he had done some things for the people, and was ready to do and dare more, attracted attention at Rome, and the Bishop has been communicated with on the subject.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 20.

Most newspapers comment more or less favorably on Ignatieff's circular. The impression produced seems on the whole favorable.

The report that Russia intends to despatch a special congratulatory mission to Kabul and to negotiate a commercial treaty with Afghanistan, is unfounded.

MERV, May 17.

The Persian Envoy sent to negotiate for the return of Merv to Persian rule, was sent back with a refusal. Russian agents continue their overtures for the submission of Merv without success. Later intelligence says all Merv chiefs forwarded to the British Legation at Teheran a request for alliance offensive and defensive with England.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 20.

The Greek frontier question will be signed on Sunday.

Mr. Goschen, the British Ambassador, starts for England on Tuesday.

PARIS, May 20.

A telegram from Beja says General Legerot's column entered Beja without resistance, and hoisted the French flag

General Forzezol and Staff subsequently arrived there.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, May 20.

The Senate rejected the nomination of Mr. Chandler as Solicitor General. The Senate adjourned sine die.

NEW YORK, May 20.

The failures throughout the United States and Canada reported to Bradstreet's during the past week were 103, an increase of 8 over the preceding week, and in the provinces 13, an increase of 4.

NEW YORK, May 20.

An Albany despatch says that Senator Robertson, the new Collector, departed for Washington last night by midnight to protest against the appointment of Conkling men to Federal offices in this State.

Three men were killed in Golden Tenor mine to-day by a cave.
