## ENGLAND AND RUSSIA NOW.

### Uneasiness Over Chinese Question.

#### DOWAGER EMPRESS OF RUSSIA WORKING FOR PEACE.

#### Desires a Definite Understanding—Anglo-Russian Interests.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—There is great uneasiness on all sides here in view of the Chinese situation, which is regarded as bringing an open conflict between Great Britain and Russia within measurable distance, and it is universally felt that the Marquis of Salisbury's invertebracy in yielding to Russian aggressiveness is responsible for the dangerous complications which can only be overcome by the most prompt and most firm intimation that Russia's open opposition to British commercial concessions must cease.

In connection with this curious story is current. It is now said that the Princess of Wales' hurried departure from England was in response to a telegram from her sister, the Dowager Empress of Russia, bearing on the Anglo-Russian relations.

It is well known that the Dowager Empress is strenuously working to conclude a definite understanding regarding Anglo-Russian interests in the far east, and it is said great importance attaches to the meeting of the sisters at Copenhagen.

#### CAPE BRETON ROUTE.

O'CONNELL'S DAY.—The celebration this evening promises to be a great success. At seven o'clock the members of the Benevolent Irish Society and the Ancient Order of Hibernians will march in procession from their halls to the railway station to meet the visiting brethren from Emerald who will arrive by special train due a quarter of an hour later. A band of music will accompany the societies. Upon arrival of the train the procession will be reformed and proceed to the Opera House after parading some of the principal streets. ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED.—The Wallace Idaho, Press reports a sad drowning accident at Chatolet lately, by which two men named Frank Holland and Thomas Allen lost their lives. The two men were out sailing in a small canoe, and Mrs. Holland was with them. The canoe was small, and the two men leaning to one side caused it to upset. Allen sank immediately, probably struck by the boat.

Mr. Holland caught the boat, and when her husband came to the surface grasped him, but he shook her loose, telling her to save herself. Before help could arrive he had gone down for the last time and the woman had fallen into the water, being taken up in an unconscious condition. A physician was summoned who succeeded in resuscitating her. Neither body had been recovered at latest accounts. It is thought that Holland is a native of Tryon, in this Province. He was a great favorite with all who enjoyed his acquaintance.

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—The Winnipeg Tribune of August 12 says: Early Sunday morning there died at the residence of his son, J. Herbert Haslam, Headingley, at the advanced age of 81 years, Thomas Haslam, who for the past two years has resided in Manitoba. Mr. Haslam was a native of Queen's county, Ireland, but removed at a very early age with his parents to Prince Edward Island, where his family took up land and where they now farm a considerable portion of the community. Mr. Haslam, in spite of his advanced age, was active up till about two years ago, since which time he has been gradually failing, though only confined to his bed for the past week. The cause of death was old age, represented in a general breaking down of the system. The funeral takes place to Headingley cemetery at 3 o'clock today. Rev. A. E. Cowley, of St. James, conducts the service.
