### Local and Other Items.

THE BORDEN.—The schooner B. C. Borden, Walter Rowe, master, left Charlottetown on September 15th to load salt at Cadiz for Halifax.

TO LOAD OATS.—The barkentine Rita is loading oats in Summerside for Summerside, G. B. The Rita is from Brazil, and is owned by Hon. William Richards.

HOG CHOLERA.—Hog cholera has broken out in Malden Township, Ont., and threatens serious loss to farmers. All the affected animals have been slaughtered.

POLICE COURT.—John Gormley appeared before His Honor this morning on two charges, both of which were proved. For being drunk and disorderly he was fined \$5 or 30 days and for assault with intent to commit robbery he was sentenced to two months imprisonment.

NEW CRUSHER.—The new stone crusher imported by the city from the Watrous Engine Company, Ltd., of Brantford, Ont., has arrived and will be placed in position with all possible despatch. The crusher is of the pattern used in large cities where modern road-making is done. The price of the crusher is \$1,360.

A GREAT WHEAT YIELD.—Mr. R. O'Leary, of Richibucto, has a field of wheat 4½ acres with a sowing of 7½ bushels, that threshed out 250 bushels or 32½ bushels to one and 54 2-3 bushels to the acre. Mr. O'Leary is a good Conservative but of course he credits the fine yield to the fact that the Laurier administration is in power.—Moncton Times.

THE WILLIAM AITKEN.—The steamer William Aitken, owned by the Messrs. Bait, has recently been greatly improved. A new boiler has been put in, the one formerly in the Napoleon III., and which is said to be one of the best boilers in use anywhere. The Aitken has done a good deal of work during the past few months, including some heavy wrecking jobs, such as the removing of the barge Grandee from Miscouche shoals. One of her heaviest contracts this season is the towing of three large rafts of timber from Picou to Sydney. Two of these she has already taken safely to their destination, and she will shortly start with the third. The Aitken is certainly an able boat, and her owners understand the handling of heavy contracts to the satisfaction of all interested.

AN I-LAND CLERGYMAN.—The St. John Telegraph says: The corporation of St. John's Church have secured the help of Rev. R. H. Haslam to assist the rector during the coming winter season. Mr. Haslam was born in P. E. Island, was educated at the Prince of Wales College, in Charlottetown, where he received the honor diploma in 1893. He acted as assistant-master for a year under Mr. Lloyd at Rolleav, and then entered the University of Toronto, studying theology at the same time at Wycliffe, taking his arts and theological courses concurrently. Mr. Haslam graduated as B. A. in the year 1899, and in theology during the present year at Wycliffe College, taking a first-class in every subject. He was ordained by the Bishop of Huron, and undertook temporary charge of the parish of Owen Sound last summer. Mr. Haslam's intention is to enter the foreign mission field after he has acquired some experience of home work.

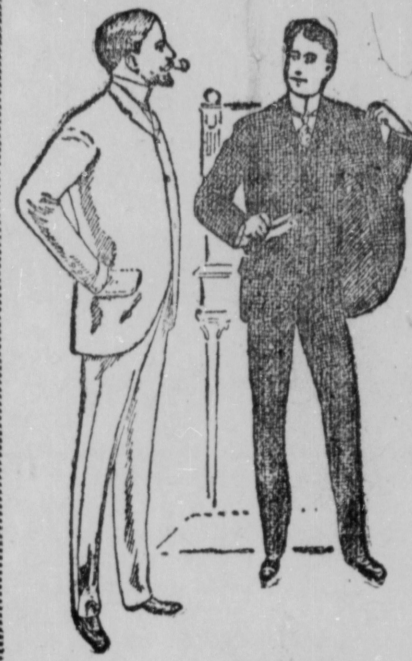
