A former Island man Dr. M. K. Inman has been appointed dean of the faculty of arts and sciences, University of Western Ontario, effective July 1. It has been learned. He is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Inman, Argyle Shore.

Dr. Inman received his Bachelor of Arts degree with honours in history, studied at Oxford University on an IODE scholarship and received his Master's and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in economics from Harvard University.

He went to Queens University in 1928 as a lecturer in economics and went to Western a year later as assistant professor in the same field. He headed the department of economics at a political science in 1939. He has written two books on economics, one of them in collaboration with a fellow Canadian.

Dr. Inman is married to the former Georgina Livingston on Clyde River. They have two daughters, Fay who is Mrs. John Dirks, Washington, D.C., and one who resides in London.

During the Second World War he served with the UWO contingent of Canadian Officers Training Corps attaching the rank of major and was regional chairman of the Canadian Legion educational services and acting director.

He said tourist operators had large investments which could be lost if the beaches could be spoiled by having the sand removed to allow wind and storms to leave nothing but bare rocks.

Robert Campbell, Liberal from St. Prince, asked if this was aimed at one individual or firm near the Brae as he said people there had been wrangling over the subject for years.

Research Director Urges Teachers To Experiment

"Teacher research; experimentation by going beyond the usually done in the classroom is one of the best methods Prince Edward Island Ministry of Education must be prepared to encourage to solve some of the province's many educational problems."

This was the advice of Dr. Floyd G. Robinson, Ottawa, Director of research, Canadian Teachers' Federation, in an address to a large gathering of teachers at the annual dinner of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation was held last evening.

Dr. Robinson, a man who is "concerned with new learning theories," said that although the idea of educational research was a new one to most people it is gaining a very important position in many areas of Canada.

"For instance," he said, "teachers now can very easily, in other provinces, set up classes with television instruction and classes without TV in an attempt to discover which area of study television can serve best and find out how many of the students can learn better from the old method of teacher instruction or by the new TV instruction periods."

"The experiments not only determine the better methods of instruction," he said, "but are powerful and engaging experiences for the teachers."

MORNING ADDRESS

Dr. Robinson, in his morning address, established the Association of Licensed Nursing Assistants; an amendment to the Revenue Tax Act (presumably to deal with the increase in the sales tax); an amendment to the Gasoline Tax Act; an Act for raising money on the credit of the consolidated fund, and an act regarding the Marketing of Agricultural Products.

address at Queen Charlottetown High School, said that "teaching methods, as we understand them today, will be changed in various ways in the next few years, and that the teacher of the future must be prepared to enter the classroom with a new perspective in mind."

With the many teaching aids now in use the teacher may soon be more than a mere instructor. "The teacher can, and will most likely become a 'director of learning,'" he said.

"The concept of the teacher may change, but it will bring a new, higher status to the profession and a real increase in the dreamed of a few short years ago."

Dial System For Kensington Slated For July 21 Cutover

W. C. Auld, manager of the Island Telephone Company reports that work involved in the change over from manual telephone service to dial service in Kensington is on schedule. The date for the cutover is tentatively set for July 21.

A modern building has been erected on the Mill River Road to house the new dial equipment. This equipment known as "crossbar" is of the most modern type of telephone switching equipment and the first of its kind on Prince Edward Island.

While entirely different in appearance and in its internal method of operation, the new system will respond to the same dialing methods as used in dial exchanges throughout the province. Mr. Auld said.

Kensington customers will have seven-digit numbers and to make local calls in the area it will be necessary to dial seven numbers. To place a long distance call, it will only be necessary to dial "0" for operator.

Following the conversion of Kensington to dial telephone service, long distance calls will be handled by the Summerside long distance centre. Buried two cables connecting the two centres has already been laid.

Prior to the cutover to dial service, each subscriber will be provided with a supplementary directory listing the new telephone numbers. This new directory will also contain information on the use of the dial telephone.

A planned program of customer instruction will be held in advance of the change over and each subscriber will be called, it was stated.
