A NIGHT OF SPORT.

Gaudet Coming to the Fore—A Record Lowered

Last night's Electric Light Sports are over at last despite the long postponement. They were among the best series of contests that have taken place in Charlottetown, though the entries were not many or the events themselves so very interesting. Bicycle races predominated; and in these Brown and Gaudet were widely separated from the others. The foot races were filled with the best of our runners, Duffy, Donahoe and Adams doing the best work. The men from Montague were in the lists last night, and they who opposed them had very nice work out for them. Want of space forbids the attention a few of the events deserve, and all we can give is the summary.

One mile novice—1st, A Gaudet; 2nd, Sam Doyle; 3rd, Lem Seller. Time 2:53 1/2.

Quarter mile (flying start, against time)—Harry Wonnacott, 34 sec; Byron Brown, 31 sec; A Gaudet, 32 3/5 sec; Sam Doyle, 34 1/5 sec; Lem Seller, 33 1/2 sec. Thus Brown won, with Gaudet second and Seller third. In this race Brown lowered the Maritime record by one-fifth of a second.

Half mile—This was perhaps the best race of the night. It was a dead heat between Brown and Gaudet, who were to race off later but did not. Harry Wonnacott was third. Time 1:20 1-5.

One mile (handicap)—1st, Brown, (scratch); 2nd, Gaudet (20 yds); 3rd, Doyle, 25 yds. Time 2:42.—It should be said that a handicap race is not one in which the riders should cluster,—it is speed from start to finish. Still last night the scratch man was with the others within two hundred yards from the start, because they lingered.

Three mile (handicap)—1st Brown (scratch); 2nd, Gaudet, (35 yds); 3rd, Wonnacott, 45 yds. Time 9:2 3-5.

The high jump was contested by Kenneth McPherson, and R A Donahoe, of Montague, and P R Harper, Ch'town. Donahoe won, with McPherson second. Height 5ft 3in.

The runs were very sharply contested. The first heat of the 220 yard (handicap) was run by H W Ritchie (scratch); R A Donahoe (18ft.); Chas Mitchell (24ft.) John J Euman, (30ft.); W Jones (30ft.). Donahoe won; Mitchell second; Jones third. Time, 24 1/2 seconds.

The second heat was run by Phillip Duffy (starting at 6 ft. mark); Harry Toombs (21ft.); A. Mills (24ft.); Ben Peters (30ft.). 1st, Duffy; 2nd, Toombs; 3rd, Mills. Time 25 sec. The final was won by Donahoe; Duffy second; Jones third. Time 23 2 5. In the final Duffy started from the two yard mark, Donahoe from the six yard and Jones from the ten yard.

The half-mile run (handicap) was contested by Phil Duffy and Leslie Adams (scratch); Donahoe (25 yds); Chas Mitchell (35 yds); Louis McIntyre (35 yds). Mitchell was winner, with Duffy second and Adams third. Time 2:11 3-5.

The hurdle race, 103 yards, was run by Duffy, Mills, McPherson, McIntyre and Donahoe. It was won by McPherson; Duffy second; Donahoe third. Time 15 seconds.

During the night Brown tried the quarter mile, flying start, in an endeavor to beat his 31 seconds. He did the quarter in 31 2-5.

The music of the 4th Regt. band was much enjoyed.

Brown is to be congratulated on his record-breaking, and Gaudet on his coming out of the chrysalis.

One rider was lacking in the races last night, and one whom we would like to see race again—Newsom.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Harry Keillor, the ten-year-old son of Miles Keillor, Oxford, N S, was drowned last week in Black River. He and some companions were playing on a raft and he fell off and was drowned. The body was recovered and buried.

SCOTTISH GATHERING.—The special train leaves Charlottetown for Souris tomorrow at 7.50 a. m., local. Members of the Caledonian Club, Boys Highland Brigade and visiting clausmen, will assemble at the Club rooms (to-morrow) at 7 15 a. m., local, in Highland costume, or plaid and bonnet, and march to the Railway Station, headed by pipers and band.

TO HAVE WATERWORKS.—A Chatham despatch says: The town council has decided on the Garrison Brook as a suitable source for a water supply, and Mr. Freeman C C Bin, of Boston, civil engineer, is to prepare working plans at once for the proposed water and sewerage system. The daily supply will be 600,000 gallons.

A DOUBLE FUNERAL.—This afternoon the rare event of a double funeral took place in this city, on Hilleboro Street. It was the funeral of Miss Ethel May Wellner, aged 18, who died on Wednesday evening and her aunt, Miss Margaret McDonald, who died yesterday afternoon. The funeral was to the People's Cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. G. P. Raymond, assisted by Rev. D. B. McLeod.

B. M. U.—The sixteenth annual convention of the Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime provinces opened at Windsor, N S, on Tuesday. There was a good attendance of delegates. The financial returns showed that for all purposes the sum of \$9,661.78 has been raised during the year, this amount being \$800 in excess of any other year.
