

Islanders Win 6-5 From Halifax St. Mary's

Beavers Come To Life In Second, Third Periods To Defeat Moncton 6 To 5

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 19.—(CP)—Saint John Beavers, after taking a licking in the first period, came to life in the second and third frames Saturday to take a 6-5 victory from Moncton Hawks in a Maritime Senior Hockey League tilt.

In a game which saw only three penalties — one a misconduct to Tommy Brennan of Beavers — handed out, Beavers had to fight for their life in the two final periods after being outscored 5-2 in the opening chapter.

The Vic Jackson, Paul Platz and Tommy Brennan trio accounted for most of Beavers scoring. Jackson had one goal and an assist; Platz scored twice and helped on another and Brennan scored one and assisted on two. Buck Whitlock with MacIntyre and Blackburn helping, and George James, helped by Armstrong and Bolan, were the other Beaver scorers.

Larry Dunville started the scoring as Moncton roared into first-period action, counting at 4-48 with Joe Delmonte and Rod MacKenzie getting assists.

Jackson's tally at 8:31 knotted the count but four replied by Hawks made it a 5-1 game until Platz finished the first period action at 18:07.

Lou Milani, Ronnie Gaudet, Dalton Barkwell and Phillips were the other Moncton scorers. MacKenzie had four assists, Milani two in addition to his goal, and Denny and Demchuk each helped on one counter.

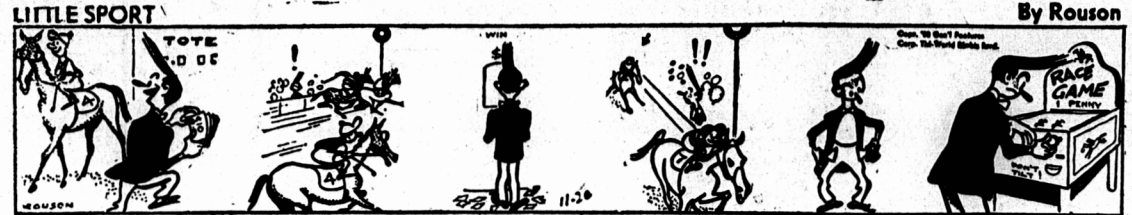

It looks like the Lamoureux-Islanders combination is already proving to be a powerful one in Big Four circles judging from the results of week-end competition. Under the guidance of their new coach, Leo Lamoureux, the husky Islanders have stepped up their league leadership to a full 11 points.

With the loss of Murph Chamberlain to the Pacific Coast and the gaining of a new hockey mentor, all in the space of just a couple of days, there was a feeling of uncertainty as to the immediate future. That was a natural reaction too. With the going of Murph so suddenly, it was natural to feel that there was bound to be a momentary lull in the process of re-conversion from one coach to another.

But happily enough, such has not been the case. Knowing full well that such a situation was making it tough for the incoming coach until time would allow him to get the swing of things, the team once again proved their real mettle and fighting spirit. Meeting Lamoureux for the first time Friday morning, the boys took to the ice here that night with the same co-operative spirit that prevailed in the Club under Chamberlain to garner the first shut-out in M. S. H. L. competition this season. It was the first victory over Saint John Beavers in four meetings, and a solid 4-0 win in the bargain.

That in itself should be sufficient to indicate the Club's attitude towards their new coach. But apparently they felt that was not enough and went one better on Saturday night at Halifax, defeating the Saint Mary's pucksters by a 6-5 decision. "What is coach Lamoureux's reaction to this? Well, in an interview at Halifax after that game he said, "Two wins in two games—you can't beat that."

But it is not only the Islanders who have had a sudden change in the coaching department. North Sydney Victorias of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League have lost one and Halifax Saint Mary's of the Big Four has gained one. David "Sweeney" Schriener, former N. H. L. scoring ace, is the man concerned in both instances.

Like the local set-up, it was another switch that was made "post haste". Last Friday Schriener resigned as coach of the Vics after his squad had taken an 11-2 trouncing from the league leading Sydney Millionaires. He told North Sydney club officials that "there was no fight in the team and that he figured he was just wasting his time." Now he will coach second-place Halifax Saint Mary's of the M. S. H. L., effective as of today.

Halifax Club officials made the announcement last night, stating that Schriener will handle the team in tonight's clash against Beavers at Saint John. This will be big news to the Islanders and the other two clubs in the circuit, Beavers and Hawks. Schriener is not the type of coach to take lightly. He has had a vast experience in the art of hockey, both playing and coaching, and his advent to the drivers seat of the Saintmarians machine is going to make them an even greater threat to contend with for league honours.

Schriener sat in on the game between Islanders and Halifax Saturday night when the Lamoureux-coached crew demolished them 6-5, and apparently has already made a number of observations concerning the Hallgonians' style of play. He said that the Halifax play was "loose—far too loose. The defencemen are cruising all over the place. That will have to stop. Too many easy goals were scored against them Saturday night." Of course Schriener didn't say how he intended stopping the "Islanders" from scoring goals—there are two other clubs in the league too, that would like to know the answer to that—and time alone will tell, if and when he does.

Islanders Play Moncton Hawks At Forum Tonight

The P. E. Islanders will be looking for their third straight victory under coach Leo Lamoureux when they hit the ice tonight at the Forum at 8:30 against Gordie Drillon's Moncton Hawks in a scheduled Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture.

Continuing to go high, wide and handsome under their new coach as they did under ex-mentor Murph Chamberlain, the Islanders are expected to be a fast moving, hard hitting aggregation when they tangle with Hawks tonight.

Although still the cellar position in the league, the Monctonians are no longer considered to be the easy mark in the four-team circuit and are expected to stage a rugged battle following their close defeat by one goal against Beavers on Saturday night.

Meanwhile at Saint John, Halifax Saint Mary's will play their first game under coach David "Sweeney" Schriener against Beavers.

Schriener New Coach Of Halifax St. Mary's

HALIFAX, Nov. 19.—(CP)—David (Sweeney) Schriener, twice scoring champion of the National Hockey League, takes over as coach of Halifax St. Mary's of the Maritime Senior Hockey League tomorrow.

Appointment of the 39-year-old native of Calgary, who up until four days ago was coach of North Sydney Victorias of the Cape Breton League, was announced tonight by club officials.

No changes will be made in the Halifax club's extensive hockey organization. Martin (Marty) Barry, who has been chief coach of the organization for several years, will devote all his time to developing the juniors. He will, however, act with the senior club in an advisory capacity.

Schriener was at the Forum Saturday night when the Saints lost to Charlottetown Islanders 6-5.

Comments On Team

"The thing that struck me about this club," he said, "was their lack of confidence. Most of the time they seemed afraid to make a move. Other times they moved, too often."

"I mean they have no direction inside the blueline. They handled that puck as if it were red hot. Every player seemed anxious to get rid of it—let the other fellow have the responsibility. Instead, they should have been hanging onto it as long as possible, forcing the opposing players to make the first move."

"This is a good-looking club. Five or six of the boys are fast skaters with a big league swing. There should be great scoring power there. But there is little co-ordination."

"What did Schriener think of the team defensively?"

"Loose... far too loose. The defencemen are cruising all over the place. That will have to stop. Too many easy goals were scored against them Saturday night."

"The new coach goes on the road with the club tomorrow and will be in the box at Saint John. He does not intend to make any immediate changes in the line-up. "It will take me about a week to get the complete picture."

Schriener severed relations with the North Sydney club last Friday night after his club had taken an 11-2 beating from Sydney Millionaires.

"That finished me," said Schriener. "There was no fight in the club. Three or four of the players simply stood around. I felt I was wasting my time and told the club officials. There were no hard feelings."

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 19.—(CP)—Five persons were in hospital here tonight after a head-on collision on the Shediac Road near Moncton. Charles Phillips, defenceman on the Moncton Hawks hockey team, suffered a severe scalp wound and chest injuries. His two children, Ronald and Linda, were reported in serious condition.

The other two victims were Mrs. Inez Doige, of Moncton, whose condition was reported favorable, and James Black, retired railway employee, also of Moncton. His condition was reported serious.

The accident occurred when a panel truck driven by Phillips attempted to pass another vehicle and struck a car driven by Edward Smith, Moncton. Mrs. Doige and Black were passengers in the Smith car.

HALIFAX, Nov. 19.—(CP)—Judge J. Elliott Hudson, president of the Maritime Senior Hockey League, tonight announced the resignation of George Mallinson from the League's refereeing staff. At the same time he announced that Casey Bradshaw of Toronto will replace Mallinson.

The League president said Mallinson resigned "owing to pressure of business" and is returning to Montreal. Bradshaw has been refereeing in the Ontario Hockey Association and the Toronto Mercantile League for several years. Prior to that he officiated in the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League.

BOSTON, Nov. 19.—(CP)—Boston Bruins registered their third victory—their first at home—of the National Hockey League season tonight, beating their prize enemies, Toronto Maple Leafs, 3-1 before a crowd of 8,487.

A 1-1 tie was smashed in the third period when veteran Woody Dumart scored twice.

The victory lifted Boston one point ahead of New York Rangers and thus out of the cellar tie the teams had been sharing. Toronto remains in first place, although Detroit picked up a single point and now is only one point behind in second place.

It was the first victory in eight games for the Bruins.
