The schooner "Carrier Dove" left Point du Chene on the 7th, at 3 a. m., for Summerside, P. E. I. Arrived there, took in a cargo of oats and returned to Point du Chene on Friday night. This is the quickest trip for a sailing vessel on record.—St. John Telegraph.

The superintendent of the Railway has directed that for the information of those interested two large and two short blasts of the whistle will be given at the crossings approaching Charlottetown, by the locomotive of any train from Georgetown having mails from the Mainland.

FROZEN TO DEATH.—Early on Friday morning the lifeless body of James Grace, of Bangor, was found by the side of Stillwater Avenue, frozen stiff. While returning from Orino, whence he had gone to peddle fish, he became benumbed by the biting cold and blinding snow storm, and perished in a short time.—St. John Telegraph.

CITY OF GLASGOW BANK failed four years ago, but its liquidation has just been accomplished. Every penny of the Bank's last debt has been paid, and the remaining assets handed over to the Company, for the benefit of its shareholders. The liquidators paid off \$55,000,000, of which nearly half came out of the pocket of the shareholders.—Journal of Commerce, Nov. 24th.

SCOTT ACT CONVICTIONS.—Before the Stipendiary Magistrate, at Charlottetown, on December 11th, at the suit of James Curtis, Inspector of Licenses for Queen's County; Patrick Kelly, City, was fined \$50 and costs, or two months imprisonment. Bernard Murphy was also convicted and fined, on the 13th inst. \$50 and costs, or two months imprisonment.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Vice-Regal Tour. MONTREAL, Dec. 12. It is now stated that the Governor-General and the Princess Louise will visit all the principal cities of the United States before returning to Canada.

The False Prophet Defeated. LONDON, Dec. 12. Major Stewart telegraphs that the False Prophet who has been threatening Khartoum for some weeks, has been defeated in two engagements, viz., at Bar and El Obed. The first detachment of the Soudan expedition has arrived at Khartoum.

Great Fire in Jamaica. NEW YORK, Dec. 12. Advice from Kingston, Jamaica, report that a terrible fire is raging there, and that the business portion of the city has been destroyed. The loss is estimated at £6,000,000 stg. Hundreds of families are homeless.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS. VIENNA, Dec. 10. Most disorderly scenes occurred at the meeting of the Hungarian Diet on Saturday afternoon. The uproar was caused by an intemperate speech of Herr Rohoney, in which, referring to public expenditures, he denounced the abuses which prevailed in public works and severely arraigned the management and control of the expenditures in this connexion. Becoming greatly excited he alleged that there was in existence a band of scoundrels holding prominent places in the present ministry, and stated that the Secretary of State was their leader. The excitement at this juncture became intense, and the presiding officer abruptly terminated the session.

As a result of the debates, Herr Rohoney, the deputy making the charges, has challenged the Minister of Works, who has accepted, and a duel will be fought tomorrow.

BERLIN, Dec. 10. M. Sibirakoff, a Russian millionaire, patron of the Arctic explorer Nordenskjold, has failed.

PARIS, Dec. 10. An editorial note in the Paris Telegraph, of Saturday, asserts that a prominent member of the British Parliament is endeavoring to organize public meetings in Paris and London to protest against any policy which would tend to divide France and England on the Egyptian question.

The Senate has unanimously passed a vote of credit for 1,000,000 francs for the relief of the sufferers by floods in the Seine district, which are now subsiding.

DUBLIN, Dec. 10. The Government has given £1,250 reward to the three Joyces who were witnesses for the prosecution in the trial of the Maantrasna murderers.

ROME, Dec. 10. Negotiations between M. DeCreis, the Russian foreign minister, and the Vatican, have resulted in the latter agreeing to contribute to the eradication of disaffection in Poland in return for Russia's agreement to allow Consistory to recognize the Polish bishops.

LONDON, Dec. 11. Five persons have been drowned by breaking through the ice while skating. The thermometer registers seven degrees below freezing point.

BRUSSELS, Dec. 11. Canon Bernard, charged with absconding to America with the treasury of the Diocese of Tournay, has enabled a Commissary of Police to obtain \$28,000 from Boston, and \$500,000 from New York, of the stolen treasure.

DUBLIN, Dec. 11. The full court of the Land Commission on appeal, have confirmed the decision of Commissioner Litton in a test case affecting 1,200 tenants on the estate of Sir John Leslie, in County Monaghan. The question in dispute was concerning the interpretation of the "hanging galls clause" of arrears Rent Act, and it was decided strictly in the tenant's favor.
