MRS. CATHERINE MCKENZIE

There passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John J. Callaghan, 51 Elm Avenue, Charlottetown, on Monday, March 3rd, 1952, one of P.E.I.'s oldest and respected citizens in the person of Mrs. Catherine McKenzie. The deceased was born at Auburn, ninety-five years ago, the daughter of the late John Trainor and Ellen Kelly. She was the last remaining member of a large family of six brothers and three sisters. In her early youth she married John J. Callaghan of that union nine children were born, three of whom survive her: J. J. Callaghan, Tena, Dorchester, Mass., and Margaret (Mrs. John J. Callaghan) City.

The deceased spent the greater part of her life in Auburn, where her many acts of Christian charity and her deep interest in her community won her the admiration and respect of all. To her own family, she was a devoted mother, unselfish, kind, considerate all through her life. The last few years before her death she spent at Lake Verde with her daughter, Mrs. John J. Callaghan. While there she was frequently visited by Rev. Urban Gillis, P.P., Vernon River, and during her illness in Charlottetown by Rev. Father Madding, C.S.R., Holy Redeemer Parish. Shortly before her death she was visited by her son J. J. of Montreal, and daughter Tena of Dorchester, Mass.

Besides her son and two daughters she leaves to mourn her passing fourteen grandchildren and seventeen great grandchildren. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place to Fort Augustus Church on Friday, March 7, where Mass was sung by Rev. T. B. Butler, P.P., who also conducted services at the grave. ALCOHOL ADVERTISING

What are the objectives of liquor advertisements? The objective of liquor advertisements are: (a) to start non-drinkers drinking. (b) to turn moderate drinkers into immoderate drinkers; every immoderate drinker starts as a moderate drinker. (c) to give the alcoholic a stimulus to drink all he can buy; every alcoholic starts as a moderate drinker. (d) to get the women drinking so that liquor will be brought into many more homes.

What are the objections to these advertisements? The advertisements are misleading and do not advertise their finished product—an intoxicated man or woman, but subtly violate truth by portraying liquor as harmless except to a comparatively small number of drinkers. The proven consequences, physical, economic, social and moral, are suppressed as well as the highway menace of the drinking driver.

As a war measure a ban was put upon liquor advertisements in Canada; why? During war it was necessary to conserve man power and materials, but liquor wastes these to the enrichment of a few at the expense of the many.

How does liquor "waste" or make a use of these resources unprofitable to the general public? Man power waste is exemplified in the alcoholic who may be seen in any city where liquor is sold. Liquor is blamed for 80 per cent of juvenile delinquency and for 26 per cent of crimes committed. It heads all factors as the occasion of V. D.

Grain is urgently needed to feed a hungry world, but is wasted in liquor which is advertised so that its sale to the many build vast fortunes for the few, even though their wealth means disease, broken homes, and crime for others.
