

Provincial Exhibition, 1884.

HORSES.

Draft horses form much the largest class on the ground; and at the head of the class stands "Barrister." This great horse has won three prizes in Dominion Exhibitions, and one at Bangor, and has been the first prize winner in this Province ever since his arrival. With one exception, every draft colt which won a prize in this Exhibition is of his get; and they are all, while well built, of remarkable size. Mr. George Bryenton's two year old filly, and Mr. Richard Stockman's two year old filly, after "Barrister," both weigh exactly 1,432 lbs.—a weight without precedent in any previous exhibition. The best foal of 1884—that of Mr. Anthony Essory—weighs 662 lbs.; the second—that of Mr. H. A. McLeod—620 lbs.; and the third best—that of the Hon. Lauchlin McMillan—562 lbs.

Next to "Barrister" stands the splendid young cart stallion "Oak's Heart," imported last spring by George Tweedy, Esq., weighing at four years old nearly 1800 lbs. This horse has not yet had time to make a record as a stock getter; but he has a great many admirers, who believe that his career will be as brilliant and successful as that of "Barrister."

Mr. George Smith's Percheron Stallion took third prize. He is a very fine animal of his kind, and is much admired by all admirers of the Percheron horse.

Mr. Hartz's imported Percheron Stallion is not on the grounds, but his two Percheron mares, with their pure bred Percheron foals, are both on exhibition, and took first and second prizes. They are admired by all admirers of horse flesh. The competition in mares and foals of this class is keen, and there are among the competitors many very fine animals.

Of carriage horses, there is a large and exceedingly interesting class. "Hernando," the stallion imported by Hon. Neil McLeod, has been awarded first prize; and his action was greatly admired to day by those who saw him in the ring. The second and third places were given to the fine young stallions of Messrs. McMillan and Rodd—both sired by the celebrated sire "Royal Harry." It was a good idea to parade this fine old stock getter and his progeny on the grounds to-day. "Royal Harry" was followed in the ring by about a dozen of his colts, many of them prize winners. Prominent among them was the splendid young stallion of James Lea, of Tryon, which, many persons think should have been awarded a first place in the competition. Mr. Lane's young stallion was much admired. There were two very handsome stallions on the grounds which were not entered for competition, viz: Dr. Jenkins, thoroughbred, imported from New York, and Mr. Newton Lorge's pure bred French Canadian. The competition in mares and foals in this class was keen and active.

It is very pleasing to note that the cattle on exhibition was larger in number and better in quality than in any previous year. The good influences of the Stock Farm were more apparent in this class than in any other. Among the exhibitors of pure bred animals, were Hon. D. Ferguson, Hon. John Longworth, Hon. T. H. Haviland, Henry Longworth, Esq., William Mutch, Hopton, George Warren, Alex. McRae, Benj. Cole, John Dewar, Robert J. Sanderson, Thomas McN. Robertson, F. G. Boyver, Peter MacN. McLean, Lewis Jenkins, W. L. Rodd. The Shorthorn and Ayrshires would have made a creditable appearance in any competition; and the Jerseys were very pretty and admirable.

CATTLE.

The Death of Watson Duchemin.

Dr. McLEON, Coroner for Queen's County, yesterday evening held an inquest in view of the body of Watson Duchemin, son of Mr. Albert Duchemin, who was accidentally shot and killed yesterday afternoon. The Jury was composed of the following gentlemen: Benjamin Hooper, foreman; M. P. Hogan, John T. Hartz, Richard Murley, George Waye, John Hartz, and Bartholomew Pickard. The verdict returned was "that the deceased came to his death by a gunshot wound accidentally received." The particulars of the sad accident are given by Charles T. Hughes, sixteen years old, son of F. W. Hughes, Esq., Clerk of the County Court, whose evidence was taken at the inquest. He said: "I went to Frederick Bevan's for an old gun I lent him, and took it home this afternoon. I took out the old breech screw and put in a new one. Directly after Watson Duchemin came in. He asked if I was going to the Exhibition. I told him 'no.' I said, 'I am going to snap a cap in the yard.' I picked up the gun and put a cap on it. I then raised the hammer, and Watson Duchemin said he would fire it. I said, 'No, you will not.' He then caught hold of the barrel, and I held on to the other part—the stock. He was trying to pull it from me and I was trying to pull it from him, and the gun went off. I did not know it was loaded. I did not tell him (Watson Duchemin) it was loaded. He did not ask me. I did not load it. It was not loaded when I gave it to Frederick Bevan. When the gun went off, Watson Duchemin staggered and fell forward, and fell on his face towards the door. I did not know he was hurt, and I ran over to pick him up. Then I saw the blood flowing from his neck. I ran and got a towel and a basinful of water, and tried to stop the blood. Finding it useless, I ran down for my father. He then sent me for a doctor. I found Dr. Dawson and brought him to the house. When we were struggling for the gun we were both laughing. We were always good friends. There was no person in the house when the accident happened. I ran as hard as I could for my father, and did not think of anything but to run for him. The blood ran very fast from Watson Duchemin's wound. He never spoke nor struggled. He opened his mouth once or twice. I do not think he was breathing when I left him. On being recalled, the witness said: I am fifteen years of age, and Watson Duchemin was about my own size. The charge entered below the unfortunate boy's jaw, penetrated the brain, and caused almost immediate death. [The funeral of Watson Duchemin will leave his father's residence, head of Great George Street, at 2 o'clock, p. m., tomorrow, for Sherwood Cemetery by train.]

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Despatches to The Examiner.

Massacre of Col Stewart and Comrades.

LONDON, Oct. 8. Col. Kitchener telegrams from Debbek the sad story of the death of Col. Stewart and his comrades after they had been wrecked on the rocks in the cañaract at Wady Garna. Three men came on board and informed Col. Stewart that he was only a short distance from Merawe, that he could easily be reached by foot, and that he could there procure assistance and board the steamer. They offered to guide him there. Col. Stewart accepted their offer, and in company with two of his men departed. They had hardly got out of sight of the steamer, however, when a number of Bedouins sprang out of the shrubbery and murdered the Colonel and his two companions. The murderers then captured the steamer, and all the party, except four, were murdered.

Distress on Magdalene Islands.

QUEBEC, Oct. 8. Dire distress prevails on the Magdalene Islands where a number of families are said to be starving. The Public Works Department has applied to the Dominion Government for the use of the steamer Napoleon III, to convey needed supplies. The request, however, cannot be granted, as the steamer is now starting for the Gulf with light house supplies, and if aid is to be despatched, it will have to come from the Quebec Government.

Bombardment Continues.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 8. The bombardment of Tamtui, by the French fleet, is still in progress. On the 6th inst. the fleet had destroyed the Chinese forts. The houses of Europeans residing in the city have been riddled with shells; but the inhabitants have not suffered any fatalities. The Chinese are strongly entrenched.

The Suakin Rebellion.

CAIRO, Oct. 8. Advice from Suakin state that the rebellion is increasing. Two fresh tribes have joined El Mahdi. Osman Digna has abandoned the attack upon Suakin and is now engaged in massacring women and children and stealing cattle belonging to the Amara tribes.

Another Battle.

VAENA, Oct. 8. A battle has taken place before the Fortress of Dhofar, in which three hundred rebels were killed and wounded.

Starting on their Tour.

OTTAWA, Oct. 8. Lord and Lady Lansdowne leave tomorrow upon their Maritime Provinces tour.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 8. The steamer with the Canadian contingent has arrived. They are all well.
