THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

MAN CAN'T BE FREE FROM RESPONSIBILITY
Everywhere in Nature we find the law of consequences. A thing once sown is sown forever. The child who blinds himself by playing with dynamite is doomed to spend his life in darkness. The man who gambles away his fortune over-works with spirits that cry for mercy and cannot find it. The time for mercy is past; chiefly because the lost spirit does not want mercy.

Why should a moment's weakness be visited by eternal punishment? Such is the stock objection. Put in that way, the objection is misleading; it assumes that wrongdoing cannot be punished otherwise than by an outside avenger. It is not necessary that God rise up in anger to visit pain and sadness upon the doomed soul. Just as with our follies in the physical order, our moral follies carry with them their own punishment.
What are the consequences of evil deeds? The first abuses his freedom. That is, he is furnished with what we call the stain of sin. It consists simply in this: when sin is committed, the soul is stained or warped in the innermost, spirit-like part of itself. So deep is that spirit-stain that nothing short of the supernatural grace of God can wipe it out. Left to himself, man cannot heal himself spiritually. The innermost part of his soul is made unfit for God through the act of sin.

The second result of sin is what we call Hell. This word may have an uncouth ring in the fastidious ears of our generation; but there is no way, save the grace of God, whereby the law of consequences, so rigid in this world, can be dispensed from in the next. If the warped soul has refused to accept the grace of God, and has persisted in his choice of evil in this world, he becomes incapable of choosing God in the next. The simple transition from life in the body to the spirit-state makes the soul's condition unalterably fixed.

PERMANENT RESULTS
God has made spiritual nature so perfect, that a wrong use of

their powers will bring about results as permanent as the right use of them. The reprobate soul has a will that is eternally and unchangeably distorted, incapable of repentance. Thus we must not picture Hell as a place peopled with spirits that cry for mercy and cannot find it. The time for mercy is past; chiefly because the lost spirit does not want mercy.

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It may be argued that there must be a difference in the application of the law of consequences in its reference to spiritual and material things, because the results of one are temporal, and of the other eternal. Yet there is this difference: we may suffer a material loss through no fault of our own, through inadvertence or incapacity.
Spiritual losses, however, cannot but be the result of deliberate free choice and clear knowledge. No man can sin through the act of another to the extent of losing his eternal happiness.

There is, therefore, a continuation of sin carried over from the present life to the next. The soul of the sinner is thrown on the shores of eternity, a banished and broken spirit, and it begins its new life in these tragic conditions. All we know of Nature's ways warns us of this. If the human spirit, after doing evil and not repenting, after rebelling against God and not humbling itself before Him, were restored to perfect integrity through the simple fact of its being separated from the body, it would be the only exception to the law of consequences.
We all expect this law to be operative in our soul for happiness; we expect that our present efforts at sanctity shall make our soul holy for all eternity. It is illogical not to apply the same law in the case of moral defilement of the will.
In our day a false humanitarianism and a twisted notion of the justice of God have led many to ignore the traditional belief of Christianity in the doctrine of Hell and its punishments. The doctrine does not deny the mercy of God. For God does not threaten us with what He is going to do with us if we disobey Him; rather, He warns us of what is going to happen to us if we leave Him.
