THE WRECK AT SOURIS Further Particulars of the Loss of the Adventurer. SUFFERINGS OF THOSE ON BOARD.

Captain Richards Thinks They Were Rescued as Soon as Possible.

As our readers are already aware, the village of Souris has just been visited by a terrible calamity. People are thunderstruck to know that two lives have been lost almost within a stone's throw of the shore.

The evening, up to about six o'clock, was fine but cold, with a slight wind from the westward, but about that time the wind veered around to the north-east, accompanied by a blinding snowstorm.

The poor creatures, men and women, now gathered on deck, as the cabin and hold were full of water, and remained throughout the latter cold night, their position being unknown to the people on shore, with very scanty clothing, the women having very little more than their night clothes, and the sea breaking over them, until five o'clock on Monday morning, when their cries attracted the villagers to the beach.

They found one woman, Sophia Richards, washed to the beach and up to the waist in water, dead, and the rest in a terrible exhausted condition. One of the men, Heber Bailey (not Daly, as printed yesterday), died as soon as he was taken on shore.

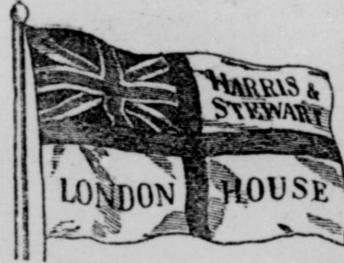

GIVING UP ITS SOULS.--The London Canadian Gazette says: "A remarkable instance of the sea giving up its spoils has recently occurred at Liverpool. In 1876 a vessel called 'Empire', which sailed from Liverpool for Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, was driven ashore near Waterloo, at the mouth of the Mersey. She had a valuable cargo, including a large quantity of costly machinery, brass and copper pieces, and also many coils of wire. Salvors recovered as much of the cargo as they could, but during the operation the Empress suddenly disappeared in the quicksands. The case, in all appearances, was then closed, and remained so for seventeen years. One day this year pieces of wire and brasswork were found on the beach near Liverpool, which proved to have been part of the Empress's cargo, and the disgorged articles were sold and the proceeds adjusted by Messrs. Lawless to the rightful owners.
