Worst Storm in History Slams Southwestern B.C.

VANCOUVER (CP)—The sun glared brightly from a blue Pacific sky Sunday and gentle breezes whiffed brown leaves on the trees still standing.

Southeast British Columbia was cleaning up the devastation of the worst storm in its history and trying hard to forget the tragedy.

Typoon Frieda had split in two and blown herself out of existence when seven British Columbians and about 40 others in the western United States with a final lash of her vicious tail.

Hundreds of workers were still toiling around the storm, the seemingly hopeless task of restoring everything to normal.

Power and communications were still out late Sunday in many parts of the ravaged area.

Five property damage was estimated as high as \$1,000,000.

Power lines were down for 40 million-hour winds, and one by drowning.

Hydroelectrically caused three others—two by heart attacks and one by electrocution following a storm.

POWER FAILS The B.C. Hydro and Power Authority estimated that half the 200,000 persons living in the B.C. to the coast were without power for one line or another.

State of Emergency Declared in Oregon

Brussels and Flemish Stage Protest March

By JOHN SWAELENS BRUSSELS (AP)—Thousands of Flemish and French-speaking Walloons rioted in a new outbreak of the language and race rivalry that often has threatened Belgium's unity.

The clashes broke out when 25,000 to 50,000 militant Dutch-speaking Flemish from the north swarmed into the capital to stage a protest march against what they called their "subjugation" by the Walloons.

Twenty persons were reported injured by sticks, staves and handkerchiefs—a kind of firecracker that can burn severely.
