SPRING OF TEMPERANCE.—On Friday last, the 15th inst., a special train with about 300 temperance men left this city to attend the quarterly session of the Grand Division, where they arrived about 12:45 p.m. A morning session was held when the G. W. Fairbank, Rev. G. W. Fisher, submitted his report and appointed the usual committees, after which recess was taken. Business was again resumed at 3 p.m., when some forty representatives were initiated. The G. W. Fairbank and G. Treasurer severally presented their reports and the various committees submitted their reports during the session. A large amount of business was put through and the work of the Division brought to a satisfactory close.

At 7:30 p.m. an audience of over 600 persons assembled in the hall to hear addresses from some of the prominent members of the Order. Excellent music was furnished by the choir, and the interest of the meeting was kept up until the time of closing. At the hour of 11 p.m. the train started on the return trip with a happy and well pleased company of tourists from the western capital. It is admitted that this session of the Division was the largest and most influential meeting ever held in the colony, which must have a great influence on the temperance work on this island.

LONDON, April 16. The British steamer Ripon City, from New York, the British steamer Calgoa, from Sydney, and the Norwegian bark Argo, from Amsterdam, collided in the Thames, off Woolwich. The three vessels came together with considerable force and were all badly damaged. The Argo ran ashore to prevent sinking in bad condition.

Russia Preparing for War.
