Allies Offer (Continued from Page 1) armistice. 2. Joint inspection teams to police the truce. 3. Possession of islands off both coasts of North Korea. 4. A U. N. demand for a ban on construction or repair of airfields. 5. Reduction of Allied military forces through withdrawal from Korea, demanded by the Reds. The Communists argued Sunday that continued possession of the islands would threaten North Korea and that the Allies should yield them because they are north of the battle front which both sides agree should be the cease-fire line. The U. N. claim that the demarcation line did not extend into the Yellow Sea and the Sea of Japan off both coasts. Maj.-Gen. Nam II, chief Communist negotiator, again objected to the Allied proposal to ban reconstruction of airfields and building new ones in North Korea. Nam termed this interference with North Korean internal affairs.

Alberton Plant Taken Over By Mar. Electric On Saturday

The power distributing facilities of the Gordon Electric Light Company of Alberton were taken over by the Maritime Electric Company on Saturday when the contract, subject to the approval of the Utilities Commission, was signed by Mr. W.A. Gordon, owner of the western plant. Mr. Thomas Phillips, Maritime Electric Company representative in Alberton, will have charge of the district, and the company's engineers will conduct a survey this week to determine whether any work is required to be done for the coming winter. The service supplying Alberton commenced in 1924 when Mr. P.W. Leard purchased the old Gordon Mill two miles from Alberton. Mr. Gordon assumed control in 1927, and at the present time power is generated by three diesel engines, totalling 210 horse power, with Reginald Travers in charge, assisted by Hillard Bell. Under the contract, these generating facilities will be leased by the Maritime Electric Company.

FIVE CANADIAN NUNS

(Continued from Page 1) of a Communist campaign to discredit foreign churches in China. They were accused of causing the deaths of more than 2,000 Chinese orphans through ill treatment and cruelty at the Canadian mission of the Immaculate Conception Orphanage in Canton between Oct. 14, 1949, and Jan. 1, 1951.

Chief Public Prosecutor Cheng Po Chen told the crowd in Sun Yat Sen Square that the nuns had "murdered" 2,116 orphans between Oct. 14, 1949-Canton's Red "liberation" day—and last Jan. 14, when, presumably, the nuns were put under house arrest. Shrieks for "revenge" followed Cheng's statement. The campaign against the mission began last February with a newspaper report that mortality rate at the orphanage was more than 94 per cent.

The Communist newspaper neglected to mention that most of the infants when they were finally brought to the orphanage were so close to death that nothing could be done to save them. The Communist Chinese Government early in March arrested the nuns and placed the orphanage under control of the Chinese People's Relief Association. Propagandists were set to work to show how well the orphans were being treated after the nuns were ousted. However, the new operators of the orphanage, unlike the nuns, refused to accept children who were near death. In the first three days they were in charge, 10 one-day-old infants were brought to the orphanage. Eight were refused admission because they were in frail health. The charges against the nuns have been characterized by L. B. Pearson, Canada's External Affairs Minister, as "grotesque and unfounded."

The New China News Agency said Sept. 21 that 16 Chinese orphans formerly run by foreign missions had been taken over because negligence and ill-treatment had caused high mortality among the children. These orphanages comprised six American, four French, three Italian, two Canadian and one Australian, all but one run by the Roman Catholic Church. Two Catholic nuns, one French and the other Portuguese, were sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment in Nanking June 3 for

alleged neglect of children in the Sacred Heart Orphanage, the New China News Agency reported. Five others were banished. The president paid a fitting tribute to Mr. Cyrus Arseneault and his committee for the arrangements made for the communion breakfast.
