### Agriculture Minister's Visit Will Highlight Dairy Banquet

**MINISTER'S VISIT**  
Island people will have an opportunity on March 25 and 26 to meet and hear Canada's new Minister of Agriculture the Hon. J.J. Greene.

Mr. Greene has accepted the invitation of the Dairymen's Association to be the guest speaker at the banquet held in connection with the 67th annual meeting.

We have, of course, no way of knowing what the minister plans to discuss. By March 25 the Dairy Support Policy should pretty well be decided as the dairy year starts on April 1, whether the minister will give some indication on what is in store we can only guess.

In any event the Friday night gathering will provide the minister with a public forum and the opportunity of good coverage.

It is understood that on Saturday plans are being made for the minister to meet privately with a smaller group of people for a discussion on island agricultural matters.

**CFA AND THE CABINET**

Next Sunday the President of the Island Federation J.A. Rodd leaves for Ottawa where he will attend the Executive meeting of the CFA prior to the annual presentation to the Federal Cabinet. Mr. Rodd this year represents the Maritime Provinces on the Executive.

The meeting in Ottawa next week is in a sense the final act in the development of farm policy from the CFA standpoint.

All over Canada for the past year small meetings and big meetings at which farm people have made suggestions and discussed resolutions have been held and from these have come the ideas behind the more than 80 resolutions considered at the annual meeting as the background for the statement to the cabinet on Tuesday, February 22.

The second meeting called by the Queens County Federation of Agriculture on Saturday evening at Bradalbane produced a very good attendance indeed, we suspect that the potato question was likely the main drawing card. It is not the intention to comment here on the decisions arrived at other than to suggest that any decision which is supported by a large meeting carries more weight.

The Federation of Agriculture has been quite aware of the desirability of holding more meetings of a local nature but has admitted that it hasn't been overly aggressive in this respect, but there does appear to be a growing concern and lively questioning

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### Theft Results In Jail Term

**SUMMERSIDE** — Clarence Edward Powers of Alberton South arraigned on a charge of theft, merchandise valued less than \$50, was sentenced to six months in the Prince County Jail when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald Tuesday morning. The magistrate warned the accused that if he appeared before him on another similar charge he would have no choice but to sentence him to a term in the penitentiary.

The preliminary hearing of Ferdinand Joseph Gallant, Summerside, charged with break entry and theft into Costain's store Cape Wolfe on Dec. 23-24, began yesterday.

The first witness called in the case for the Crown was Alvin Costain, owner of the store. Mr. Costain testified that a safe which had been removed from the office of the store contained approximately \$2,000. The witness also identified in court a hammer, a container of paint and a screw driver that he had owned at the store. The witness said that he identified a safe with the door missing as belonging to him, at the Alberton detachment.

Donald Nelson, chemical analyst, at the crime detection laboratory at Sackville testified that a spot of paint found on the hammer was found to be identical in colour and composition to the paint in the container. Constable Fred Connolly, of the Summerside RCMP, told of seeing Gallant at his residence on Notre Dame Street where he had a warrant to search. The accused produced from his wallet \$14 and \$4.65 in coins, from his pockets, Constable Connolly stated. Constable Lindsay Robbins of the Summerside detachment stated that he had searched the upstairs part of the house with Constable William Maxwell of the St. Eleanor's police and had found \$114 in notes and \$2.71 in the bedroom of the accused.

**CAR STOLEN**  
Benny Grady, Summerside, stated that he had gone home on the night in question around 10 o'clock. He said that George Grady was on the phone talking to town police reporting that his car was stolen. Mr. Grady said that they later found the car

parked near the town CN station. Constable Don Bartlett of the Summerside RCMP testified that he visited the residence of George Grady at 468 North Market Street. He said that he advised Mr. Grady that he was there to seize the license plate on his car. He testified that the car was later towed to the RCMP barracks at Summerside.

Constable James Fox of the Summerside RCMP testified that he and Sgt. Harry MacKay of the town police went to visit George Grady at his residence on North Market Street. The witness stated that while looking through the trunk of George Grady's car he found a hammer. He said Mr. Costain later identified the hammer as belonging to him.

Constable Eric Bishop of the Summerside RCMP said that on the afternoon of December 24 he patrolled to St. Eleanor's to an area known as the old dump road behind Jelly's furniture store. There the safe was located and he said that he observed that the door was pried off.
