Parliament At A Glance

WEDNESDAY, March 16, 1966 Finance Minister Sharp told the Commons he is asking Canadian investors to boycott securities issued by U.S. corporations overseas.

The move was a reaction to current U.S. guidelines which Mr. Sharp said may put undue pressure on Canada's capital market.

Additional spending estimates totalling \$173,701,576 for the fiscal year ending March 31 were tabled in the Commons.

Legislation that would allow federal aid for financing cold storage and ball-freezing plants for fishermen was introduced.

The Commons also was told a debate on capital punishment is to start next week after a two-day supply debate.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported farmers intend to sow 29,616,100 acres of wheat this year, up five per cent from 1965.

THURSDAY, March 17 The Commons meets at 2:30 p.m. to start study of a series of minor government bills. The Senate stands adjourned until March 22.

Day Of Dentist Is Seen Ending

VANCOUVER (CP)—Dr. Gilbert Parfitt, acting dean of dentistry at the University of B.C., sees the day when dentists won't be needed.

He says he believes dental research will perfect a way of making tooth decay—and dentists—things of the past by the year 2,000.

Dr. Parfitt said he's convinced that with a modest research budget he could find a non-poisonous substance which would protect teeth from decay.

"It could be in the form of a gum we would chew, a spray or a mouthwash," he told 300 UBC pre-dental students Tuesday.

The protective coating would probably be adapted to dental use from a substance already invented by industry, such as the plastic coating now used on some frying pans to which food particles will not stick.

He said he had been refused a research grant for such a project by the B.C. Research Council and by private sources.

"yet the university has given me \$4,000 and an assistant to do a silly little research program on types of toothbrushes."

For the present he told the dental students, tooth decay could be cut down considerably by abandoning toothpastes and using ordinary baking soda to brush the teeth, along with a mouthwash of salt and water.

Wheat Acreage Increase Being Planned For West

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian farmers intend to increase wheat acreage this year to the second-highest total on record, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Wednesday.

A survey by the federal agency of farmers' plans as of March 1 produced a figure of 29,616,000 acres, up five per cent from the estimated actual total of 28,282,000 last year.

If farmers carry through with their plans, acreage will be second only to the 29,685,000 seeded to wheat in 1964.

Although the bureau did not say so, the increased acreage planned is seen as a reaction to booming wheat sales abroad and a developing short supply situation internationally.

The bureau warned the amount of acreage actually seeded to wheat and other grains may vary from forecasts because of planting conditions, seed availability, market outlook changes and the effect of the DBS report itself.

Of the prospective 1966 wheat acreage, 29,206,100 is of the spring variety, also up five per cent from the 1965 total 27,920,200. The 1966 spring wheat total is also a shade below the 1964 record of 29,230,000.

Prospective winter wheat acreage is 410,000, up 13 per cent from the 362,000 of last year.

SEEDING HIGHER Manitoba farmers intend to seed 3,370,000 acres to spring wheat, up four per cent from last year. Saskatchewan would be up five per cent to 19,500,000 acres, and Alberta up two per cent to 6,200,000.

For all Canada, prospective oats acreage would be virtually unchanged from last year at 9,597,100. Barley, meanwhile, would rise 18 per cent to 7,119,700 acres from 6,037,600. Rye would be down nine per cent at 678,000 acres compared with 745,500 last year. Flax would be down five per cent to 2,130,000 acres from 2,239,000 and rapeseed down by the same percentage to 1,368,000 acres from 1,435,000.

Acreage intentions for the Prairie provinces for grains other than wheat, with previous year's figures in brackets:

MANITOBA Oats 1,680,000 acres (1,630,000); barley 800,000 (801,000); rye 196,000 (151,000); flax 1,050,000 (1,160,000); rapeseed 150,000 (145,000).

SASKATCHEWAN Oats 2,200,000 (2,300,000); barley 1,100,000 (1,750,000); rye 309,000 (340,000); flax 600,000 (610,000); rapeseed 538,000 (555,000).

ALBERTA Oats 2,750,000 (2,650,000); barley 3,900,000 (3,390,000); rye 181,500 (200,000); flax 430,000 (414,000); rapeseed 680,000 (738,000).

Corn for grain at 780,000 acres and soybeans at 275,000 acres are both up four per cent, while potatoes are up six per cent at 317,200 acres.

USE MORE LAND In what was regarded as another reflection of another strong demand for export wheat, farmers intend to cut the amount of idle land. Their intentions indicate a reduction of Prairie summerfallow acreage by six per cent from last year's 26,580,000. The prospective 1966 figure is 25,100,000 acres, eight per cent below the 1960-64 average of 27,200,000.

The prospective wheat acreage is 11 per cent above the 1960-64 average and comes at a time when Prairie farmers have harvested four successive bumper wheat crops following the 1961 Prairie drought.

Acreage planned for durum wheat is 10 per cent higher than last year's 840,000. The 1966 figure is 920,000 acres, but still well below the 1960-64 average of 2,065,000.
