

### THE RECIPROCITY TREATY.

The Sherbrooke (Lower Canada) GAZETTE of Saturday last, in noticing the passage of a resolution by the United States Congress to abrogate the Reciprocity Treaty, says:—

"This will be sad news to the people of Canada, and especially to those of the Eastern townships. All of our exports of horses, cattle, sheep, oats, dairy produce, lumber and timber, in fact almost every staple product of the townships have, since the Reciprocity Treaty went into effect, found a market in the United States, free of duty. If the Treaty be abrogated, as there is now every reason to believe it will be, that market will be closed to us or only opened by the payment of a war-tax of twenty-five or thirty per cent. Two causes have probably operated to induce the United States to take this step. First, the necessity of raising a large revenue to carry on the war; and second, and we believe more especially, on account of the unfriendly feeling manifested by a majority of the press and a large portion of the public towards the North in their struggle to put down the rebellion. There is no denying the fact that a majority of our newspapers, and those of the greatest circulation, with but few exceptions, have almost expressed the hope and belief that the slaveholders of the South would gain their independence, and the Union be broken to fragments; and these papers, and that portion of the public whose sympathies run in that direction, have used their influence to bring about this result. The prospect now is that this sympathy will cost us a few millions for putting our frontier in a state of defence, the loss of the Reciprocity Treaty, and give in return a Union with the Lower Provinces, and a free trade with a couple of millions of people in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, &c., five or six hundred miles off, (on condition of building a railroad to carry our produce to their market), instead of twenty-five or thirty millions on our border."

The repeal of the Reciprocity Treaty seems to be seriously contemplated by the dominant party in Congress, a result which would lessen the value of agricultural produce in the Western States. We still doubt if they will consent to the repeal—and Canada, and either cause Nova Scotia to send less fish and coal to the American market, or the consumers to pay higher for these commodities to the extent of their purchases. Irritating disputes in relation to the fisheries are also to be feared. The repeal policy seems narrow in the extreme, but it no doubt proceeds partly from irritation caused by the undeniable sympathy expressed by certain provincial journals with the infamous robbers and murderers who profess to represent the Confederate States on the American frontier, and partly from the preponderance of New England in Congress, and the ignorance that prevails in relation to the principles of political economy.

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,** that by the following Order of the President, no person will be allowed to enter the United States from this Island, without a Passport issued by the undersigned, or authenticated by him:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE,  
Washington, Dec. 17, 1864.

The President directs that, except immigrant passengers directly entering an American port by sea, henceforth no traveller shall be allowed to enter the United States from a foreign country, without a passport. If a citizen, the passport must be from this department, or from some United States Minister or Consul abroad, and if an alien, from the competent authority of his own country; the passport to be countersigned by a diplomatic Agent or Consul of the United States. This regulation is intended to apply especially to persons proposing to come to the United States from the neighbouring British Provinces. Its observance will be strictly enforced by all officers, civil, military and naval, in the service of the United States, and the State and municipal authorities are requested to aid in its execution. It is expected, however, that no immigrant passenger, coming in manner aforesaid, will be obstructed, or any other persons who may set out on their way hither before intelligence of this regulation could reasonably be expected to reach the country from which they may have started.
