Anglican Prelates Warn Civilization Threatened

LONDON (Reuters)—Anglican prelates from throughout the world warned Monday night that nuclear weapons threaten civilization and the "corruption of mankind."

They called for the banishment of war and the achievement of true peace.

The Anglican archbishops and bishops, meeting in their once-a-decade Lambeth Conference, issued an interim statement on peace and war. They have been in session since July 3 at Lambeth Palace, the London residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

"Unless war and its causes can be banished," they said, "nuclear weapons threaten the annihilation of whole peoples, the destruction of our material civilization and the corruption of mankind."

TRUE PEACE

"But merely to banish war is not to achieve true peace. True peace means an order in which men are free to live under justice and according to righteousness: in which the resources of the world are developed and distributed for the benefit of all; in which the only war is against poverty, ignorance, disease and oppression; in which the results of man's knowledge and discovery are used not for destruction, but for enlightenment and health."

To create true peace, the prelates said, sacrifices will have to be made by all peoples and all nations.

"Nations have their own legitimate interests which it is their duty to preserve but, too often, they exaggerate their own

11-Year-Old Is Youngest To Enter Big Fiddling Contest

SHELburne, Ont. (CP)—Old-time fiddlers from Canada and the United States will set this Western Ontario village of 1,204 inhabitants tapping their toes and clapping their hands Friday when the Canadian open championship old-time fiddlers contest begins.

"We call then upon the nations to forgo those policies of self-interest which deny the interests of others."

"We call on people of all faiths, and those who lead them, to work and pray persistently for the development of a community of peoples wherein, and whatever limitations of national sovereignty may be necessary, all shall live under the rule of law."

"Only in such a community can the present unequal division of resources be remedied and assistance brought to nations which are struggling with dire poverty and distress."

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—An attractive 42-year-old divorcee who told police she shot her drug addicted boyfriend and then tried to commit suicide was much improved Monday. Detectives said she would probably make a court appearance sometime this week.

Mrs. Minnie B. (Connie) Nicholas was well enough Sunday to comb her hair and send for a lawyer.

She asked criminal lawyer Charles W. Symes to defend her against a preliminary murder charge in the death of Forrest Teel, 54, executive vice-president of the Eli Lilly and Company drug firm.

Mrs. Nicholas emerged from a coma Saturday and told detectives and reporters about the shooting and her attempted suicide.

"I was just going to scare him," she said. "You don't shoot the person you love."

Says Emotionally Upset Are More Prone To Colds

TORONTO (CP)—Colds are more frequent and more prolonged in emotionally upset persons, says Dr. Daniel Cappon of Toronto.

In an article in the Canadian Medical Association's Journal's current issue, Dr. Cappon says psychiatric patients had 2 1/2 times more colds than non-psychiatric patients.

Some of Dr. Cappon's clinical observations, based on a survey of 400 patients to determine the association between the common cold and the individual, indicated the emotional status favoring colds varied from excitement to depression.

But Dr. Cappon also said paradoxically some "cold free" patients were seriously afflicted by psychiatric disorders.
