**PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.**

**Premier Laurier's Utterances Criticised.**

**Senator Ferguson Delivers an Important Speech on the Island's Claims.**

**STRONGLY PROTESTS AGAINST PROPOSED ARBITRATION**

**And Demands Fulfilment of the Late Government's Policy.**

OTTAWA, June 16.—After orders of the day were called yesterday afternoon, Mr. McNeill called attention to the cable report of the remarks made by Mr. Laurier, in England. The Premier is reported to have said that Canada did not desire Great Britain to depart from a free trade policy by taxing foreign goods for the purpose of preferring colonial products, and also declaring that no better naval defence of Canada was required as the United States was the only country with which Canada could be at war. Mr. McNeill said it would be nothing short of a calamity if after this Parliament had agreed upon a policy of Preferential Trade, after Mr. Chamberlain had assented to it, and after the principle had been affirmed in the colonial conference the Premier of Canada had lifted up his voice against the doctrine thus breaking up the colonial concert. Nor could he understand how Mr. Laurier could say that the United States was the only country with which Canada could be at war since Canada would be at war with any country that made war on the Empire.

Sir Richard Cartwright refused to discuss the matter on the basis of cable reports. He had confidence he said in the wisdom and prudence of Mr. Laurier and he declined to believe that he had said anything he should not have said.

Sir Charles Tupper while justifying Mr. McNeill for bringing the matter up, agreed that it would not be right to accept a press report as authoritative. Sir Charles could not believe that the Premier would in this way, repudiate not only the policy of both parties in this country but his own most emphatic declarations.

The House then went into committee and discussed the tariff. Several changes were made, notably a reduction in the coal duty. A customs charge of 54 cents a short ton will now be made.

Early in the session Sir Charles Tupper secured an order for the names of the officers dismissed or retired during the past year. The partial returns brought down in reference to the order refer to the outside customs service alone and enumerates 87 displacements, of which 22 were for partisanship. Thirty-five appointments have been made to vacant places down to date.

In the Senate yesterday afternoon, Hon. Mr. Ferguson called attention to the correspondence recently brought down between the Government of Prince Edward Island and the Dominion relative to the financial claim of the Island against the Dominion and enquired what the government intended to do regarding Premier Peters' proposition that these claims should be settled by arbitration.

Senator Ferguson outlined the history of the claims and protested against Premier Peters' proposition to put the Island's claims in regard to railway construction to arbitration. The province had not received its share of the public funds expended on railways. He was strongly of opinion that the representatives of Prince Edward Island in parliament should not be restricted in making claims by the

judgment of any court of arbitration. There was a grave doubt of the independence of Premier Peters in the matter. The Premier of the Island, had accepted employment from the Dominion Government thus placing himself under a personal obligation to the Liberal Executive. Senator Ferguson hoped that the Government would refuse to submit the railway claims of the Island to arbitration, but would carry out the policy of the late Government with reference to the construction of the branch railways so much needed on the Island.

Sir Oliver Mowatt replied. He declared that he was not prepared to say what the policy of the Government on the subject was, as the matter had not yet been considered. The claim of the Island would, he said, receive most careful consideration.

**Barnato's Suicide.**

LONDON, June 16.—The papers publish columns of obituaries of the late Barney Barnato. It is said he thrice attempted to commit suicide before he left Cape Town.

**QUEEN'S DIAMOND JUBILEE.**

Colonial Forces Reviewed by the Duke of Connaught.

On the 15th inst; the Duke of Connaught reviewed the colonial troops who are to take part in the royal procession. The spectacle has called forth the following comment from one leading paper: "Never, in the palmiest days of old Rome, was there a more significant and wondrous spectacle than that which took place yesterday afternoon at the Chelsea barracks. His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, representing the Queen, inspected and reviewed the representative contingents of the army of Great Britain. There were drawn up in line colonial soldiers from the four quarters of the globe. Many there were from lands and continents unknown to the Roman Empire. There stood in the ranks men from the far North, the far South, the far East, the far West, men from Europe, Asia, Africa and Australasia—types of many races, white and black.

"The past week has seen the arrival of numerous military detachments from the colonies to take part in the Queen's Jubilee festivities. A splendid body of Maori police are the latest arrivals. They are generally men of fine physique, wearing smart uniforms, and are very popular everywhere.

**A PRAYER IN THE SCHOOLS.**

The Department of Public Instruction in Quebec has ordered a three days holiday of all the elementary schools of the province and has directed that the following prayer shall be offered in all schools on the 18th inst:

"O eternal and almighty God from whom all power and wisdom come, by whom kings rule, we are assembled here in Thy presence to pray Thee long to preserve our Most Gracious Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria in the affections of her people. Grant, O merciful God we pray Thee that she may desire only that which is in accordance with Thy will, that she may seek it with wisdom and know it with certainty and accomplish it perfectly for the glory and honor of Thy name and for the welfare of Canada and of all the British Empire. Amen."
