THE LONDON BREAD RIOTS!

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

LONDON, Feb. 10. The latest estimate places the damage done in the riots of Monday at under £5,000. All witnesses agree that rioters were mainly ruffians of villainous looks, and habitual criminals of the lowest order.

The Daily Telegraph says that the Government intends to prosecute the more violent of the Socialist speakers who addressed the mob at Trafalgar Square.

The Times severely censures the heads of the police department, who, it is proved, were themselves unfit for the positions they occupy.

It is reported that a mob assembled at Deptford this morning, and is marching towards London, seeking the houses along the route.

MIDNIGHT.

The city is quiet, the crowds disappeared by ten o'clock and the streets are now deserted, the panic is subsiding. The scare is without parallel in the history of London.

Ten thousand desperate men gathered in the streets and only needed some one more reckless than themselves to lead them to commit the wildest excesses.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—11 a.m. Yesterday reports of an outbreak in Deptford, proves to be a hoax.

Bulgaria and Turkey

LONDON, Feb. 10. Bulgaria and Turkey, on the advice of the Powers, will forego their demand of indemnity on Servia.

It is reported at Athens that all members of the reserve force under 32 years of age will be shortly summoned for active service.

Forster Dying.

LONDON, Feb. 10. Right Hon. Wm. E. Forster, ex-Chief Secretary for Ireland, who for some time has been confined to his room by illness, to-day suffered a relapse, and is sinking rapidly.

Sworn In.

DUBLIN, Feb. 10. The Earl of Aberdeen, the new Lord Lieutenant, and John Morley, the new Chief Secretary, have arrived here, and been quietly sworn in to their respective offices.

Meeting of the Servian Cabinet.

BELGRADE, Feb. 10. The Servian Cabinet, at a special meeting to-day, presided over by King Milan, decided to immediately purchase 50,000 rifles and 25,000,000 cartridges. King Milan has started for Nissa.

Schooner Abandoned.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 10. Schooner Narcissus, of St. John's, Nfld., Captain Slocumb, from Baltimore for Halifax, with a cargo of corn, was abandoned at sea, Feb. 3rd, during heavy gale, east of Barnegat. Crew saved.

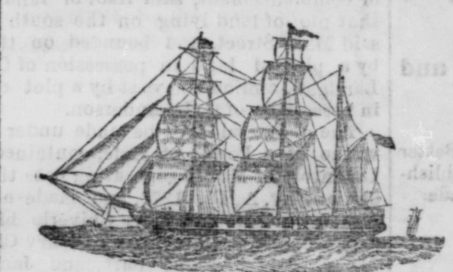

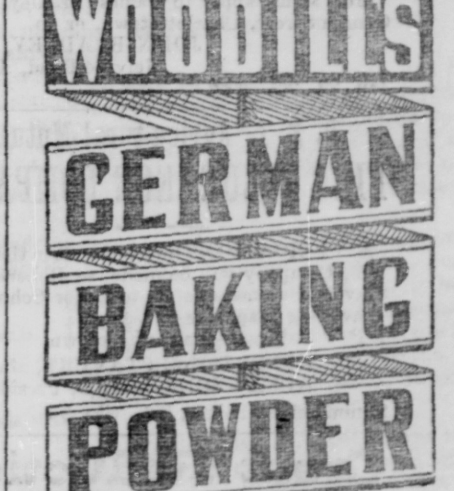
