Had a talk today with Brig. W. Reid in regard to the big athletic meet which is scheduled for Dominion Day, July 1st. Was pleased to hear that arrangements are progressing famously.

Judging by the enquiries and entries from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and even Newfoundland, the athletic gathering could be the biggest and most interesting to take place in the Province.

Once upon a time the Maritimes produced the best athletes, but of late years we seem to have fallen into decadent ways in this material right here. Young men and boys of grand physique can be seen on the streets at any time.

Of course physique alone is not enough. There must be ambition, strength of will and also environment. Great size and seemingly perfect physique is in fact no criterion.

Ambition, perseverance and practice make perfection. The writer has met and seen many insignificant looking fellows who were champions.

Alfred Shrub the great English runner, who in 1908-10 held all records from one to fifteen miles weighed only 135 lbs.

Louis Guertin the great French Canadian high jumper (6 ft. 7 in. with weights) was very skinny looking - about 145 lbs. On the contrary many modern Ajaxes who paraded on their shapes alone couldn't excel in any sport.

Now this is where the benefit of big athletic meets comes in. They would supply a long-felt want, Canada, and particularly the Maritimes, are low on Olympic caliber; we haven't sent an athlete to the Olympics for many years. A renaissance in athletic prowess is long overdue.

One of the easiest and most natural way to promote "physical fitness" would be to set up athletic paraphernalia on all public school grounds to give those who have a natural predilection for athletics, a chance to begin young.

It is the responsibility of teachers to see that their pupils are "physically" as well as mentally fit. A little encouragement from teachers would be a big boost to track athletics - and Physical Fitness.

There are three events for girls (for women). A girl's club from the mainland is entering. Our girls should compete also. They ought to be able to use an extravagant gas, to jump as high, dive as deep, and come out as dry as their sisters from the mainland. The athletes from the "other side" will likely be good. Our boys will require to train hard the next few weeks. Most of them, however, can get "in shape" quickly.

The ten-mile bicycle race and ten-mile road race, with the last mile of each finishing on Memorial quarter mile track during the meet will be big attractions. MacInnis, the popular Island runner, has already entered. Several others are expected. The bicycle race is likely to get a big entry. Great interest was shown in the Victory Cleaner's race at Summer-aside.

To make it an outstanding and historic occasion it is up to the boys and girls of the county districts and towns to get together at the cross roads and village greens to practice and prepare for the games. Entries should be made with the director, W. W. Reid any time before June 26th (Do It Now) in order that they may be published, and amateur cards issued.

It is hoped that nature will smile on July 1st. A fine day is the greater part of what is required for a successful meet. We want to provide diversion and recreation for our already numerous tourists - not leave them to their own devices entirely. They will be cordially received in the City of Charlottetown at any public event or at any time. The city is bedecked with flags and colored lights, and is bizarre in appearance. There is some special event taking place almost every day.

Tigers Stop Yankee Rally To Win 8-6; Giants Narrow Cub Lead To 1 1/2 Games

Detroit Tigers battered two rookie pitchers for all their runs and hits in the first four innings Wednesday to defeat New York Yankees 8-6 but had to stave off a desperate ninth inning rally to even their series with the American League leaders at one victory apiece.

The Yankees outthrew the Tigers 12 to 11 but Detroit bunched four of them in the second against Johnny Kucks for three runs and ganged up on Tom Satrian with a four-hit, four-run assault in the fourth to take an early 8-1 lead.

Southpaw Bill Hoelt, with the aid of home runs by Jim Delsing and Frank House, struggled to his sixth triumph although he needed help from Babe Birrer in the ninth. In the only other American League afternoon game Boston Red Sox continued their mastery over the Kansas City Athletics with a 9-6 victory behind an 11-hit Sox attack.

In the National League New York Giants came up with a five-run spree in the ninth for a 7-2 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. The win narrowed Chicago's second place margin over the Giants to 1 1/2 games.

Night action in the National League was Brooklyn at Cincinnati and Philadelphia at Milwaukee. In the American League it was Cleveland at Washington and Chicago at Baltimore in a six night doubleheader.

Against Detroit the Yankees made one hit in each of the first seven innings but managed only two runs. Each time it was on a home run by Eddie Robinson, who socked his 12th and 13th of the season.

Yanks threatened to pull even in the ninth but were held to two runs as Birrer came on to put out the fire.

Mel Parnell got his first win of the season as the Red Sox came up with their seventh victory in eight games.

Parnell gave up homers to Gus Zernial, Bill Renna and Bill Wilton and got relief in the ninth from Tom Hurd. Jackie Jensen's two-run homer in his ninth of the campaign, started Kansas City's Ray Herbert on the way to his sixth straight setback. Ted Williams contributed a pair of singles which boosted his average 10 points to .388.

Reliever Paul Giel, former Minnesota all-America footballer, scored his first major league victory in the Giants win.

His opening double launched the big ninth inning which broke a 2-2 tie. It was the season's third loss for Cub starter Paul Minner, who has won five.

Giel took over from Giant starter Jim Hearn to start the seventh. Giel is now 1-1 for the season. WASHINGTON (AP) - Dean Stone snapped Washington's seven-game American League losing streak with three-hit pitching Wednesday night as the Senators defeated Cleveland 7-0. Johnny Groth and Roy Sievers smashed home runs off loser Bob Feller.

Groth belted his home run with none aboard in the second inning and the Senators chased Feller during a six-run spurge in the fourth when Sievers crashed a three-run homer.

Mickey Vernon launched the six-run uprising with a single and Groth walked. Clint Courtney singled to centre, scoring Vernon, before Sievers hit his home run. Stone, who posted his third win, struck out four and walked five.

It was a thriller all the way and both teams came up with some fine defensive baseball. Kane made the most spectacular play of the evening when he lunged to his right to spear a line smash and cut short a Dodger rally. Jack Burke and Kenny MacDonald roamed their centre field pasture land like gezeles and pulled in some long fly balls that looked destined for extra bases.

Burke was the victim of a MacLeod wild pitch in the ninth inning. Jack twisted away from the pitch but it hit him on the back of the head. The fleet young fielder was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital for medical treatment. Fortunately the blow did no real damage but let us hope that the league officials have learned a lesson from what could have been a bad accident. There should be an ample supply of new baseballs available to use when the approaching twilight makes good visibility difficult and also, the umpire should call the game if these new balls are not at hand.

It is hoped that there will be a bigger crowd tonight when the Dodgers take on Tom MacFarlane's Stars. The Dodgers are hustling a nd each of the two games already played have been crowd pleasers, with fine defensive ball and some solid hitting, at least in the first game on Sunday. Anyone who was at Tuesday's contest didn't leave it un-

Gordon Pirie Makes Fast Time

BRUSSELS (AP) - Britain's Gordon Pirie put on a fantastic burst of speed late in the 2,000 metres race here Wednesday night to win over two crack Hungarian runners.

The 24-year-old British runner beat Laszlo Tabori, hero in the sensational four-minute mile in the recent British games at London's White City Stadium.

Third came another Hungarian star, Sandor Iharos.

Pirie was clocked in five minutes, 12.6 seconds; 5.6 seconds slower than the world record set in 1948 by Belgium's Gvaston Reiff, but still one of the best speeds returned over the distance this year.
