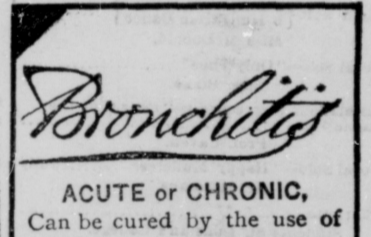

### The Coal Deal in Nova Scotia.

A large delegation of members of the House of Commons waited on Sir John Thompson and his Ministry a few days ago, to press on his attention the serious nature of the legislation lately passed by the Nova Scotia Government. The delegation was introduced by Dr. Cameron, of Inverness, C. B., who briefly yet forcibly pointed out the very serious danger that threatened independent coal mines that were not in combination with the syndicate that would control the mines of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton under the new law. Mines that would have been opened and worked in his country, he feared, would now be forced to remain idle, and a great amount of labor would be unemployed in consequence. He showed that the new law would affect not only the mines of Cape Breton, but also those of Nova Scotia; and he pointed out how the syndicate might obtain control of all the mines in Nova Scotia, and then transfer their privileges to an American company, that would have the control of the greater part of the coal of the United States. In this way the manufacturers of the Dominion and coal consumers generally would be at the mercy of a huge monopoly that would open or close the mines at will. He was followed by Mr. Wood, of Westmorland, N. B., and Grand Bois, of Quebec. Several members from Ontario also spoke on the question after Dr. Weldon, of Albert, N. B.

The constitutional question was ably argued by Dr. Weldon, of Albert, N. B., and attention was called to the necessity of guarding the interests of the people of Canada who use coal. Mr. McKee, of Cape Breton, defended the action of the Nova Scotia Legislature, and pointed out that any company could under the present statutes obtain the privilege granted the syndicate for a term of twenty years, with the right of an extension for another term. Mr. McKee is to be general manager of the new company and is to receive, I learn, a handsome salary. Sir John Thompson expressed the opinion that he did not see how the Federal Government could interfere in a question that was purely within the jurisdiction of the Local Legislature. It was only on questions in which both the Federal and Local Legislatures had joint control, that interference could be justified; and the Federal Government would have no more right to interfere in matters affecting the coal industry of Nova Scotia than they had to intermeddle with legislation respecting the timber limits of a province. He said, however, that if it was found that the coal company unduly taxed the people of Canada for coal, that an export duty could be levied in the same way that an export duty had been placed on logs exported from the Dominion.

The action of the Nova Scotia Government is exciting considerable interest in the Upper Provinces, and is generally condemned. It is said that through carelessness in the wording of the contract with the company that the province is liable to receive only \$30,000 a year instead of \$123,000, should it become the interest of the combine to shut down the Cape Breton mines.

### The Panama Scandal.

A MOVEMENT TO OVERTHROW THE GOVERNMENT DEFEATED. The chamber of deputies a few days ago rejected, by a vote of 289 to 229, M. de Roulede's proposal to delay the debate on the motion of confidence until after the conclusion of the budget debate.

De Roulede and the other Boulangist deputies believed they would be able to overthrow the government if they could secure more time. The motion of confidence was to be debated on Friday.

In the Parliamentary commission of inquiry on Thursday, the deputies disapproved at length M. Bizot's proposal that all documents bearing upon the connection of suspected or accused deputies with the Panama scandal be placed at the disposal of the commission.

The proposal referred particularly to the papers in the hands of M. Franqueville, the examining magistrate.

It was resisted strenuously by several members, and eventually was withdrawn.

The commission then resolved by a vote of 17 to 7 that a member be appointed to make a provisional report to the chamber on all the information obtained by the commission from documents in its hands and from witnesses examined.

Charles de Lesseps told several reporters that he had been so accustomed to seeing his father once a week that his father's physicians feared a longer delay of the visit to La Chesnaye might throw their patient into a dangerous fever.

For the same reason they hope that Charles de Lesseps will be allowed to visit La Chesnaye every week or two for at least months. Charles de Lesseps apparently has no expectation that the sentence will be annulled. He believes that France is done with the Panama Canal company, and that the work will be completed by the United States, or at all events, with American capital.

In the majority of these cases the man defeated was probably the ablest and best known of the two.

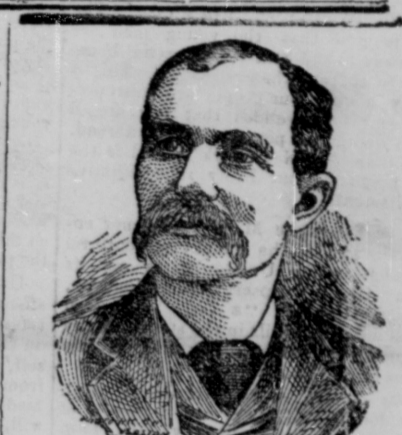
