Destructive Insects.

Insects destructive to vegetation are becoming very numerous. Nearly all the apple trees in the country have been destroyed by the cocoon, popularly known as the bark louse. Currant and gooseberry bushes are yearly denuded of their leaves, and even the forest trees do not escape the depredations of voracious creatures of various forms. A few days ago the writer observed, in a lawn which had been laid down many years ago, large patches of grass completely killed. On walking over these spots, the ground yielded to the pressure of the feet, and on examination it was found that the turf had been undermined and could be lifted off like a carpet. The roots of the grass are wholly destroyed. The devastator is a grub varying in size from a half inch to one and a half inches in length. The large ones are nearly half an inch in diameter. The head is brown, and armed with powerful horny jaws, the body is nearly white, except at the tail where it is brown. It is provided with six strong legs, and on turning up the grass it is seen rolled up in the form of a crescent. This insect, we believe, is the grub of a beetle, of the same family as that known in England as the Oak-leaf (Phylloperaga quercina). In this Island it is sometimes called the Saw-bug, and is usually found at the roots of cabbage plants, which they greedily destroy. The grubs of this kind do not confine themselves to the roots of cabbage or of grass. The roots of wheat and other grains, and even of young trees, are sometimes destroyed by them. It is related that in England about seventy years ago, a farmer and his man gathered eighty bushels of the parent beetles!!! It is to be hoped that our Island is not doomed to endure a visit from these insatiable insects. Unfortunately, we have but few insectivorous birds, and while the insects are increasing, the birds are disappearing—Islander.

MAIL COURIERS.—The contracts for the Inland Mails from Charlottetown to Summerside, and from thence to Tignish, including all the branch mails, were closed on the 8th inst. The tender of J. L. Holman, Esq., for the conveyance of the mail to Summerside, was accepted. The tender of Mr. James Fitzroy, for the conveyance of the mails from Summerside to Tignish, via the Western Road, including the branch mails, was accepted. Mr. Wm. Cairns tendered for and obtained the Mail from Summerside to Kensington, and also from Summerside to Freetown and Beedee, semi-weekly. The contract for the Mails across Cape Tormentine was given to Messrs. Irving and Muttart, the former contractors. THE TELEGRAPH OFFICE, in this place, has been removed to the lower part of Pope's Building, on Central Street. The new office is very nicely fitted up. There are two rooms, a large slide window dividing the room occupied by the operator from the one in which the business is done. Indeed, we believe that very few operators would go to the trouble that he does, in order to acquaint the travelling public and agent of the steamboats of their arrival and departure.
