### Local Teachers Meet At Hunter River

The local Teachers Convention was held recently in the school in Hunter River with Mr. Bennett Carr of Hunter River in the chair and Miss Irene Morrison acting as secretary.

The meeting opened with the reading of the minutes of last meeting by Miss Morrison. There were 36 teachers present.

The following committees were appointed: Resolution—Sister St. Mary, Sister St. Cecilia, and Miss Helen Gallan; Nominations: Mrs. Reta Todd, Mrs. Flora Todd, and Mrs. Thelma Akworthy.

Press: Lynetta Brown and Mrs. Jennie Stevenson. Question Box, Miss Jennie Moore.

An address by the president Mr. Carr was followed by the report of the year's activities of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation read by Mr. Ray Higgins.

The Supervisor, Mr. Jelly, in his address stressed the importance of sending in reports promptly. He also stated that school attendance has increased over 10% to what it was four years ago.

Mr. H. B. MacLean of Vancouver, B. C. originator of the MacLean method of writing, gave a very interesting address on the mechanics of the art of writing.

Mr. D. B. Lusty, assistant supervisor of school broadcasts (Maritime and Newfoundland) gave a review of what is being accomplished in these radio school presentations.

Mrs. Cudmore spoke on behalf of the Junior Red Cross. Miss Mona Wilson was called upon to introduce the next speaker, Dr. O'Meara, now connected with the Department of Public Health in Charlottetown. Dr. O'Meara gave the teachers a talk on the importance to children of correct dental care. Nutrition, oral hygiene and early dental treatment were the three important things.

The afternoon session opened with an address by Dr. Lloyd Shaw, director of Education for P. E. I. He asked the teachers to remember that teaching is a true profession, that it requires mature minds and considerable preparatory training before one could hope to be proficient in it.

Mrs. MacKenzie made comments on the Course of Studies pointing out the changes from last year. He also urged the teachers to stress the teaching of language.

Miss Helen Yeo, Prince of Wales College English teacher, gave a demonstration on the teaching of spelling.

Questions from Question Box were read by Miss Jennie Moore and answered by Dr. Shaw, Mr. Jelly and Mrs. MacKenzie.

The following slate of officers was brought in: President, Miss Jennie Moore, Vice President—Sister St. Mary, Secretary—Miss Addie Halliwell.

Resolutions were moved by Sister St. Mary and seconded by Mrs. Flora Todd, expressing the thanks of the convention to the trustees of Hunter River School and to the people of the community for their hospitality, and to all those who had assisted with the program.

The thanks of the teachers was expressed also in a resolution to the Government for acceding to the request of the P. E. I. Teachers Federation for sick leave for teachers.

The meeting adjourned after singing God Save The King.
