President's Report — The report of the executive committee was delivered by the President, Brig. W. W. Reid. He reported that the total membership on May 15 was 937, made up of 863 boy members and 74 adult leaders. There were 387 Wolf Cub Packs active in 17 Wolf Cub Packs. At present there are 476 active Scouts in the Province in 25 active Scout Groups, 20 Scout Groups and one Rover Scout Group. The Y's Men's Club in Summerside has formed two Group Committees to cope with the two Troops and Packs now active there.

Prince Edward Island Scouts enjoyed an active year in camping. A total of 280 boys attended ten camps for a total of 1869 camper days, a considerable increase over the previous year. Four Island Scoutmasters attended the Maritime Gilwell course held in New Brunswick, and 20 Patrol Leaders attended the Provincial Silver Arrowhead course held at Camp Buchholz. Fifty Patrol Leaders received Junior Lander training, Part A, and several other courses were conducted through the year.

The annual financial campaign was a decided success, as \$34,675.55 was received from various centres in the Province. Success also attended the efforts of those who worked to make the Apple Day a success, of which the net proceeds amounted to \$370.71. Public services during the year included tree planting, traffic control, a Christmas Toy Show and several Christmas good fund drives. One rural troop made a survey of the fire hazards and fire fighting equipment in their district.

The Committee expressed its thanks to the volunteer workers sponsoring bodies. Group Committees, City Firemen and the R. C. M. P. who have given so generously of their time and talents. Provincial Commissioner — The Provincial Commissioner, S. M. McInnis, also presented a report at the meeting. He gave a brief account of the three special courses held during the year, the Fireman Courses, one in Charlottetown and one in Summerside, and one course in Traffic Control held in Charlottetown, which were intended to train the boys for the Civil Defence program. Mr. McInnis stated that "Civil defence training is becoming very important in our daily lives," and he recommended that further emphasis be placed on this phase of Scout training in the coming year. 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consumption over 200 kilowatt hours will be charged. The present minimum charge is \$1.25 for the first 10 kilowatt hours, 25 cents a kilowatt hour for the next 190 kilowatt hours and 2 1/2 cents for every kilowatt hour over the 200 mark is charged. The minimum charge for general service (light and power) up to three kilowatts connected load under proposed rates would be \$2.50 a month for the first 20 kilowatt hours. Two cents a kilowatt hour for the next 180 and 1.5 cents a kilowatt hour for all consumption over 200 kilowatt hours would be charged.

The private householders minimum charge under the proposed rates in the rural areas will be \$4.00 a month for the first 20 kilowatt hours. Four cents per kilowatt hour for the next 180 hours and two cents a kilowatt hour for all consumption over 200 hours a month will be charged. Under the present rate 31 cents a kilowatt hour for all consumption over 200 kilowatt hours is charged. A breakdown of the revenue from existing rates for the year 1951 with the figures of the revenue from the proposed rates in brackets is as follows for Charlottetown: Private householders, \$236,672, (\$247,180); commercial, \$173,861, (\$166,542); power, \$75,175, (\$75,175); street lighting, \$5,170, (\$5,750); \$13,149, municipal, \$66,460, (\$67,860). Total under present rates, \$566,060.50 and under proposed rates \$568,306.80.

Revenue Figures — Following are the revenue figures for the rural areas during the conditions outlined for Charlottetown: Private householders, \$181,440, (\$270,759); commercial, \$51,843, (\$68,816); power, \$11,172, (\$10,290); street lighting, \$5,170, (\$5,750); municipal, \$15,942, (\$17,516). Total under present rates, \$262,567, and under proposed rates, \$383,131.

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, Chairman of the Commission presided. The other members of the Commission, Messrs. L. B. McMillan, secretary, and W. R. Brennan were also present. Mr. R. W. Manning was consultant accountant for the commission. Mr. John R. Kaye of the Engineering Services Company, Halifax, who presented the proposed rates, Mr. P. The Maritime Electric Company was represented by Messrs. Dennis Stairs, Montreal, H. F. MacPhee, K.C. and V. A. Ainsworth, general superintendent of the Company. Messrs. J. O. C. Campbell, K.C. appeared for the Province; Mr. K. M. Martin, K.C. for the City of Charlottetown; D. L. Mathieson, K.C. for the Innkeepers Association; A. Walden Gaudet, for Geogetown and Montague; and Melvin MacQuaid for Souris. The average cost for the construction of one mile of rural electricity is about \$2700 it was stated by Mr. J. R. Kay, in answer to a question by Mr. H. F. MacPhee. In his question Mr. MacPhee suggested that the average cost of construction would likely increase shortly and that the seven per cent return would not be sufficient.

Rural Extension — The proposed rates will enable the extension of rural electrification, stated Mr. Kay in reply to a question by Mr. O. C. Campbell, Deputy Attorney General. Some incorporated towns will have to pay a double increase in rates it was learned from questions asked by Mr. Waltham Gaudet. Continued on page 15

Special Activities At South Rustico

On the new wharf constructed by the Federal Government last year at Anglo Rustico, the enterprising young fishermen from South Rustico, Oyster Bed district and Rusticoville will assemble together in a body on Sunday next at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon with their boats and fishing gear, to receive a blessing for protection through the fishing season.

This religious ceremony has been carried on in most all the fishing centres in the Province for the past number of years. On this occasion this will be the first time that this special ceremony will be performed in this centre. This new wharf has a surface area of over six thousand square feet, including a head block of thirty by thirty feet which should accommodate a number of boats and fishing gear. Its location is nicely centered between the two harbors known as the big and little harbors. From the extreme northerly storms it is well sheltered in the lee of Robinson's Island which forms part of the National Park. A feature of this island is its bathing facilities as there is absolutely no under-tow. The heavy sea waves are broken up a long distance out from the shore which eliminated a danger that has been seriously dreaded in the past.

This inland situation all along the farming section provides opportunities for summer homes and cabins, and the long stretches of quiet waters from North Rustico to the shores of Covehead are well adapted for canoe and pleasure sailing.

Mayor MacDonald Gives Review Of Civic Affairs

"I do not feel that our citizens should be unduly alarmed because we have revalued our City for tax purposes," Mayor B. Earle MacDonald said last night in an address before the Y's Men's Club of Charlottetown.

"The current revenue is \$554,000," Mayor MacDonald added. "I could make a guess and estimate 1952 at \$575,000, an additional \$25,000. This amount of money is so little that there certainly cannot be an appreciable increase in taxation. If your valuation is high, it is a real valuation, and consequently we can assume if the value is high that the rate will be lower—low enough to compensate for the higher valuation."

His Worship explained that during the last six years of office, he had felt that a great inequality existed in the valuation of real property in Charlottetown, and that a raising of the rate to obtain sufficient revenue was increasing the inequality more each time.

"Those who were assessed too high would be paying still more," he said. "For example take two houses identical in structure, possibly within a block of each other. The value of each house should be \$4,500, but in the inequality of assessment, one dwelling is assessed at \$3,000 which is \$1,500 too low, the other is assessed at \$6,000 which is \$1,500 too high. This at our present rate makes a difference of \$90."

"With a view to rectifying this condition, the Westmount Realities Company of Montreal was interviewed on recommendation of Mr. Mooney, the executive director of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities. The result was that

a local Board consisting of Messrs. Walter Grant, Albert Baker and Arthur Belcher was set up to work under the advice of Messrs. Rankine of the Westmount Realities Company.

"This Board has done a splendid job. Land, buildings, zones, etc., have been classified and assessments are mathematically 100 percent accurate and equality has been established. I feel this is as important to our citizens as was the External audit of 1939."

Y's Men Jim Cameron presided at the meeting last night, and introduced the guest speaker and also called on other members to introduce their guests. Among the latter were City Clerk James Fullerton, Ron Atkinson, Ken MacIntosh, of Truro, and L. MacLellan.

Reviews Civic Affairs — After complimenting the members of the Club on their worthy contribution to the well being of Charlottetown, particularly in a moral and spiritual sense, Mayor MacDonald said the work of civic administration is most interesting, and frequently it has been possible to point with pride to things accomplished. "No one was ever known to fall asleep at our Council meetings," he said, "and there have been times when the 'give and take' was fairly rugged. I have come in for my share of criticism, but usually had the good fun of handing out a few wallops of my own. The clashes in Council have left no scars and al-ways, in the end, the members of the Council individually and as a
