LIB-CON. ASSN. MEETING AT MURRAY HARBOR SOUTH.—Pursuant to notice a large and enthusiastic body of electors assembled in the Public Hall on Wednesday evening the 30th, the candidates Messrs. Prowse and McKinnon being present. The branch President Murley presided and Mr. J. Livingston acted as secretary. The meeting was addressed by Messrs McKinnon, Prowse, J. McDonald, J. Livingston, and the B. President, and the following resolution unanimously passed: That this Association places itself on record as being heartily in accord with the manifesto issued by the Hon. D. Gordon. Harmony and enthusiasm prevailed throughout.

ENCOUNTERED A GALE.—The North Sydney, C. B. Herald says: The southeast gale which swept the Cape Breton coast on Monday the 21st ult., was very severely felt by vessels unfortunate enough to be caught within its radius. A vessel that encountered a gale in its fury was the schooner Delvtrus, Capt. Cooke, which arrived at North Sydney on Saturday from New London, P. E. Island. The vessel had a cargo of potatoes and oats shipped by Mr. D. A. Wedlock, of Stanley Bridge and a number of cattle on deck. She arrived here with the loss of 30 sheep, 3 head of cattle, and the cargo under deck in a damaged condition. Capt. Cook states that the gale was one of the worst he ever experienced and it was feared that the vessel would founder in a heavy sea. Nearly every sail was carried away and the decks were swept by the heavy waves which carried overboard the live stock and everything movable. The vessel was towed into port by the Merrimac in a very helpless condition and about four feet of water in her hold.

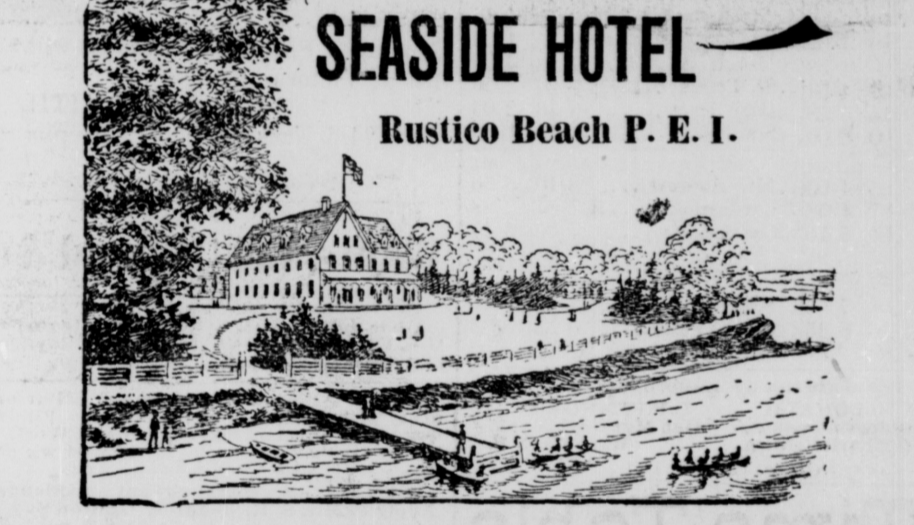
