Charged On Two Criminal Counts In Supreme Court

The trial of Francis Arsenault of Summerside, the only criminal case on the docket, opened yesterday morning in the Supreme Court in Summerside before Mr. Justice Mark E. McGuigan.

The defendant is charged on two counts; (1) indecently assaulting an 18-year-old Prince County girl, and (2) robbing the sum of \$23 from a wallet belonging to this girl.

He is being tried simultaneously on both charges. These offences against the girl are alleged to have been committed on Christmas Eve last, when the girl, while en route from Charlottetown to spend the Christmas holidays at her home west of Summerside was obliged to wait two or three hours in Summerside for the train going west.

It was established that soon after she went to a nearby restaurant for something to eat, the accused entered the restaurant and seated himself beside the girl who upon being annoyed by his insistent remarks that he was going to walk to the station with her asked to be moved to another booth.

After she had left the restaurant it is alleged that the accused followed her, and overtaking her as she reached the station, he held her arms, put his hand over her mouth, struck her with his fist whenever she attempted to scream for help, dragged her across the railway tracks and underneath a deserted building, where it is alleged that he indecently assaulted the girl and later robbed her of the \$23 and her railway ticket that were contained in the wallet.

Six witnesses appeared for the crown before yesterday's hearing adjourned until this morning. The crown is represented by J. Harold Goodwin.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell who presided on Tuesday, appointed W. Chester S. MacDonald to defend the accused as he did not have counsel and stated he could not afford to hire any.

Mr. MacDonald appeared yesterday for the accused. The petit jury of twelve men hearing the case, was chosen yesterday morning from a panel of twenty-six.

Death of Noted Island Professor In Michigan
The following is taken from the Kalamazoo, Michigan College Almanac of April 1952. Dr. Milton Simpson graduated from Acadia with the Class of 1906:

Dr. Milton Simpson, Professor Emeritus of English Language and Literature, died April 11th at Bronson Hospital, Kalamazoo, Mich., after emergency treatment for injuries received in an automobile accident the day before.

"For thirty years a member of the faculty, Dr. Simpson's vigorous personality had made its imprint on many members of the college family. Lively enthusiasm and deep personal interest he shared with all with whom he came in contact. His death came as a shock to his many friends and admirers.

"Upon his retirement in 1949, Dr. and Mrs. Simpson were honored by his former students who presented them with a purse to make possible a trip to the land of Shakespeare that Dr. Simpson had made so vivid in his teaching. Upon his return, Dr. Simpson served the college as a special lecturer in English, and he spoke before many groups in the Kalamazoo area.

"President Everton, in paying tribute to Dr. Simpson stated, 'One of my first experiences at Kalamazoo College was to have Dr. Simpson share with me his enthusiasm for Shakespeare's Reminiscences "And Gladly Teach." In the fly-leaf of this book there is the following inscription: "To Professor Simpson, a great teacher and a loyal friend." What finer tribute could we bring him today? The title of the book is taken from Chaucer's Prologue: "And gladly would he learn and gladly teach."

"This was characteristic of the life of Milton Simpson. With vast enthusiasm for his subject, he transmitted that enthusiasm for it to his students. As a scholar and as a teacher, he enriched many lives."

"Memorial services were held in Truesdale Chapel April 14. Dr. T. Thomas Wylie and Dr. John Scott, Everett Officiated. Dr. Simpson is survived by his wife, Grace Fowles Simpson; two sons, Harold B. Simpson, 37 and Donald F. Simpson, 39 of Washington, D.C.; a daughter, Mrs. John A. Palmer, 36 of Pittsburg, Penn.; four grandchildren; a sister, Miss Sophia Simpson, and three nieces of Prince Edward Island, Canada.

"Prior to the services for Dr. Simpson, the family announced that memorials may be made to Mandella Library. This memorial fund has been designated the Milton Simpson Memorial Library Fund and will be used towards the purchase of special books for the English Department."

Dr. Simpson was born at Belvedere that may last for months. Their storerooms packed with tons of food and other supplies. Red spokesmen announced over the air that "We are fighting for German unity." Fifty persons are estimated to be in the building.

I.O.D.E. National Chapter Annual Meeting Ends

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 4 (CP)—The national chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire today urged the Federal Government to encourage and assist British immigration to Canada by whatever means will prove most effective.

The resolution, passed at the closing session of the 52nd annual meeting, said the percentage of British persons in relation to total immigration to Canada had fallen off.

The chapter also asked the Federal Government to prepare and distribute a simple, one-sheet record of the contribution made by Canada to world peace and of Canada's position in foreign affairs.

A resolution dealing with Canada's ties with the Commonwealth said: "It is increasingly clear that our ties with Britain are not being made paramount in Canadian life."

Deligates voted to offer 11 war memorial bursaries in 1953, one for each province and one for the Yukon. The bursaries, valued at \$2,000, will be awarded to enable Canadian students to do post-graduate work in history, philosophy, English or French literature at any University in the British Empire overseas.

This action was taken in response to a request by the central committee of the fund for advice and help in this important undertaking.

To fully complete the hospital's facilities and services for this area, the Junior Chamber of Commerce elected a special committee with full power to act in its behalf and in behalf of the community for this solicitation work which will begin activity right after the opening dinner to be held in Summerside Thursday June 26th.

Chairmen of this committee for the Kensington district are Archie Johnstone and Fred Davison of Kensington. Let's Talk It Over

June goes with September, we think for the distinction of being the pleasant month of the year. But both have to be relatively dry to achieve this pre-eminence. Mr. Sun is welcome as often as he appears in June and September. In July and August he gets over-ardent causing people to avoid his embrace and seek the shade. He has just the right touch to make us glad we're alive in the two months that fringe the really hot days of mid-summer. Let's hope he's a frequent visitor this June.

Something should be done about the parking of cars too near the street corners in Summerside. When a car is parked too close to an intersection, the motorist who wishes to turn into the other street finds his vision blocked so that making the turn becomes pretty much of a gamble. In spite of the parking meters, which have relieved congestion a little the parking problem is bothersome here, and steadily growing more so. There should be "no parking" areas, at every intersection, (perhaps there are) and the rule covering the restrictions should be rigorously enforced. This would perhaps aggravate the parking situation here, but might prevent a serious accident.

Recent events on Koje Island may have shown a weakness among those in charge, but it has also clearly demonstrated the wide cleavage between Russian, Japanese, and German conceptions of civilized conduct and those of the Americans and British. The American "weakness" is one acquired through the gradual growth of civilized ideals which places human life and welfare on a high plane of importance.
