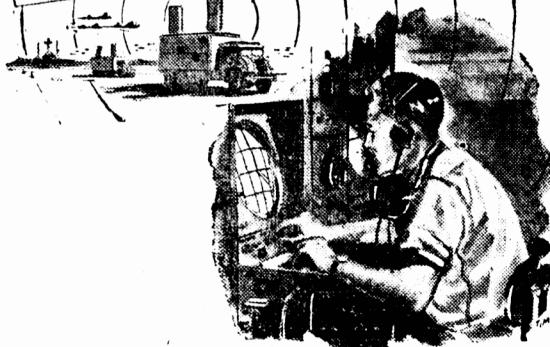

KEIR - During the evening hours of February 28, 1951, there passed peacefully away one of South Granville's eldest and highly respected residents in the person of Hector F. Keir. Although the deceased had been in failing health for some time, and was confined to his bed for nearly two years, his death came as a shock to his family and friends. He bore all his illness patiently without any word of complaint. The late Mr. Keir was born in South Granville on April 7, 1863, and was the last surviving member of the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Keir (nee Catherine Falconer). With the exception of two years spent in Vancouver, B.C., the remainder of Mr. Keir's life was spent in South Granville where he was successful in farming as long as his health permitted. He was a man of sterling character and always ready to help anyone in time of trouble. He was a member of the South Granville Presbyterian Church, and for over a period of 20 years he acted as precentor at all the services. On Dec. 15, 1897, he married Emma Wilson of Hampton, P. E. Island, who predeceased him on March 11, 1949. To this union were born ten children, five of which survive to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate father, namely: Margaret, Mrs. Walter Wakelin of Charlottetown; Susie, Mrs. Willard Ferguson of Winsloe, and John W., Annabelle and Alexandra at home, who tenderly cared for their father during his illness. Left to mourn are also three grandchildren at Winsloe. The funeral, which was largely attended was held from his late residence on the afternoon of March 1st, and was under the direction of Mr. James Andrews of Hunter River. Services at the house and grave were conducted by his pastor, Rev. D. A. Campbell of New London, who spoke words of comfort to the bereaved, taking as his text, Isaiah 35:10: "And the ransomed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away." "The Lord's My Shepherd," "My Race is Run, My Warfare O'er" and "Take Comfort Christians," all favorites of the deceased, were sung. Pallbearers were: Walter G.
