Canada at The Exposition.

TORONTO, Dec. 18.—J. Gordon Jardine, Canadian commissioner to the Paris Exposition, stated that the final jury has given five additional grand prix, twenty-five gold, fifteen silver and five bronze medals to Canadian fruit, Canadian, Ontario and Quebec ministers of agriculture being among the prize winners. Canada, Mr. Jardine says, must have 200 awards for agriculture and horticulture alone, beating all foreign countries, including the United States, while in other groups, including manufactures, she has more than held her own.

Proposed Reception in St. John.

ST. JOHN, December 18.—At a meeting of the citizens held yesterday morning in the mayor's office, it was resolved that the soldiers returning in the Lake Champlain will be the guests of the city during their stay. If possible they will be served with meals together. If a suitable place cannot be found they will be distributed among the leading hotels. If the soldiers are banquetted at the drill shed it is probable that the Lady Fusiliers' company will be re-organized and will act as waiters in khaki uniforms.

In England and Wales female teachers are more and more outnumbering their male colleagues in schools inspected by the Government and corresponding to our own Public and High schools, and a like tendency is here also manifested. In England and Wales there were, in 1870, 6,847 female teachers, and 6,882 males. Last year women had won a striking triumph with 80,057 female teachers, as against only 28,978 males. The change is partly due to the natural adaptability of the fair sex to the teaching of the young, but in part due also, it must be admitted, to the fact that lady teachers, being non-smokers, and practically abstainers or nearly so, and being also unready to call for so many of the luxuries of life as their male competitors, will accept considerably lower salaries.

THE New York Commercial Advertiser refers to the probability of a commercial treaty between Newfoundland and the United States and says: "There is reason to believe that the annexation question will not figure in the matter this time. The Newfoundland fisheries are very important to the United States. Connected closely with the fisheries question is the larger one of whether we are going to exempt Canadians from the stringency of our protective tariff, especially against their natural products. It never was so evident as it is now that we shall need some of those products, and that American capital will help to develop the resources of the Dominion, there being recent and conspicuous proof of this in several notable enterprises." Perhaps the United States will soon find it to be to their interest to admit many of our food products free of duty.

FOR THE CHRISTMAS COOK.

Timely Hints on Some Attractive Specialties For the Holidays.

PLUM PUDDING

Many families use a simple suet pudding for Christmas, serving it in flaming brandy. The best rule for this calls for a cup of stoned raisins chopped in coarse bits, a cup of shredded suet chopped fine, a cup of molasses, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, half a teaspoonful of cloves, half a nutmeg and half a teaspoonful of salt. Add now three eggs, white and yolks well beaten together, and, last of all, an even teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a cup of milk.

Beat the pudding thoroughly with a spoon and put it in a well buttered tin mold holding about two quarts. This will give it ample room to swell in. Cover it closely with the tin cover, so no water can get in, and plunge it into a pot of boiling water deep enough to reach two-thirds the height of the mold. Let the pot of water be covered and the water boil steadily around the pudding for three hours. Make it Christmas day and serve it with a good wine sauce.

RECIPE FOR CHEESE CAKE

Wash and scrape some lettuce. Put wine into a mortar and pound and pulp the lettuce therein. Now squeeze out the juice, mix up some flour from spring wheat and allow it to settle, after which pound again, adding a little pig's feet and pepper; finally pound again, draw out into a cake, smooth and cut it into shape and boil in hot oil.—Time of Demosthenes.

PIGEON PIE

Make puff paste crust and cover your dish. Let your pigeons be nicely picked and cleaned. Season them with pepper and salt. Put a good bit of fine fresh butter, with pepper and salt, in their bellies and lay them in your pan. The necks, gizzards, livers, pinions and hearts lay between them, with the yolk of an egg and a beefsteak in the middle. Put as much water as will almost fill the dish and lay on the top crust and bake it well. This is the best way to make a pigeon pie. The French fill the pigeons with very high forcemeat balls around the inside, with asparagus tops, artichoke bottoms, mushrooms, truffles and morsels of bacon and season high, but that is according to different palates.

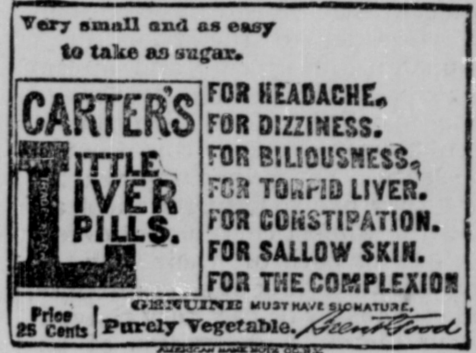
