You are the dealer, neither side vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠KJ98 ♡AQ4 ♣8 ♢AQ72

1. One club. When distribution is 4-4-4-4 the general rule is to open the bidding with the suit beneath the singleton. The purpose is to conserve bidding space so that all three suits can be shown at the lowest possible level.

Suppose the opening bid selected were, one spade. Then if partner's response were two diamonds a two heart rebid would show a second suit, but if partner's rebid were three diamonds it would not be possible to show the third suit without going into the four level.

2. But if one club is bid originally a spade can be bid over, one diamond, and two hearts over two diamonds, thus naming all three suits at a comparatively low level.

3. Two notrump. This bid denotes a hand with 22 to 24 high card points, balanced distribution, and strength in all suits. Since our hand can be accurately described in one installment by the opening two notrump bid, it is a clearcut choice. An opening club bid would not only run the risk of a pass by partner but would also make it impossible later to identify the exact nature of the hand held.

4. One club. The usual rule is to start the bidding with the higher ranking of two five-card suits, but when the suits involved are spades and clubs it is generally best to start with one club. Again the purpose is to conserve bidding space.

If the first bid chosen were one spade it would be necessary to go into the three level to show the clubs if partner's response were two hearts or diamonds. But by starting with a club the spade suit can be named in the one level. The spades can later be rebid to identify the five-card suit.

**Victoria, B. C. Newspaper Observes 100th. Birthday**

**VICTORIA (CP)**—The Colonist celebrates its 100th birthday today.

The newspaper was founded as a weekly Dec. 11, 1858, by a strong - voiced Nova Scotian named Amor de Cosmos.

The curious mixture of Latin, French and Greek in his name was his own idea. At birth he was given the unassuming name of William Smith. Changed by statute, his name was meant to convey he was a "lover of the universe."

Two years after the British Colonist was born in a waterfront shack, its circulation reached about 3,000 and De Cosmos turned the newspaper into a daily.

It has been publishing continuously since—the oldest daily newspaper west of the Great Lakes.

**LINKED WITH PROVINCE**

The history of the Colonist, often brash and bumptious and at times in its early history little more than a political trumpet, is linked closely with the political and economic growth of British Columbia.

Its editors and publishers have included a number of men remembered for more than their connection with the newspaper.

De Cosmos himself was elected premier of B.C. and a member of Parliament for Victoria.

His successor, D. W. Higgins, became Speaker of the legislature.

John Robson, an associate of Higgins, also became premier of B.C.

The Colonist began taking its largest strides under the editorship of Charles H. Lugin, 1901-1917, whose family founded the Fredericton Gleaner.

Lugin served under two publishers, Robert Dunsmuir and J. S. H. Matson, both remembered as dynamic figures in the province's business life. Dunsmuir also served a term as premier of B.C.
