The Arrears of Rent.

LONDON, Nov. 17. In the House of Commons, last night, Mr. Dickson (Liberal) asked Mr. Gladstone to extend the payment of arrears of rent for three months. He received a favorable reply from the Premier.

The Trial of Rebels.

CAIRO, Nov. 17. The disagreement between the prosecution and defense in the trial of the rebels here has been settled and the trial is now proceeding amicably.

The Murderers of Prof. Palmer.

CAIRO, Nov. 17. The authorities here entertain a strong hope of securing the murderers of Professor Palmer and party, and having them promptly executed.

British Troops in Bad Health.

LONDON, Nov. 17. A despatch from Cairo states that the health of the British troops garrisoned in Egypt is very bad.

Pat Casey to be Hanged.

DUBLIN, Nov. 18. The trial of Patrick Casey, charged with the murder of Bridget Joyce, at Conamara, was concluded yesterday. The jury were out only eleven minutes, and returned a verdict of guilty. The judge sentenced Casey to death; hanging will take place on the 5th of December.

An Electric Storm.

LONDON, Nov. 18. An electric storm raged throughout the country yesterday, and telegraph communication was, in consequence, very much interrupted.

Lough Mask Murder.

LONDON, Nov. 18. The Government are now in possession of full details of the Lough Mask murder.

Sir Stafford Northcote's Health.

LONDON, Nov. 18. Sir Stafford Northcote intends going to the Mediterranean for the benefit of his health. In his absence, the Opposition in the House of Commons will be led by Sir Richard Cross.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 16. A heavy gale is blowing around the coast to-day, particularly in the southwest. A brig has been lost with all hands off St. Ives. A small vessel is ashore in St. Ives; another vessel has been totally wrecked at Hoyle.

The third rule of procedure was agreed to without division in the Commons. In the House, to-night, the debate on the closure question was resumed. The 4th rule, that when before a division the decision of the speaker or of the chairman of committee that "ayes" or "noes" have it, is not challenged by more than twenty members, the speaker or chairman may forthwith declare the determining of the House or of committee was passed; that speaker or chairman of committee may call attention to the continued irrelevancy or tedious repetition on the part of a member and may direct him to discontinue his speech, was also adopted. Adjourned.

Five pilots have been drowned while attempting to reach a distressed vessel in the Firth of Forth.

The recommendations of the conference on sub-marine cables, recently held in Paris, are published. The principal of these are that willful damage to cables should be punishable and damage be recoverable by civil action; that fishing boats and other vessels should be bound to keep a mile distant from ships laying cables, and that fishing boats losing their gear in endeavoring to avoid cables should be able to recover against cable companies.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. A barge loaded with 700 barrels of sugar, while proceeding down the bay to-night, in tow of a tug, was run into by the steamer City of Worcester and sunk. There were on board the barge at the time Capt. Taylor, his wife, mother, three children, and two deck hands, all of whom except the captain were drowned. The cause of the accident is supposed to be a miscalculation of the force of the tide.

LONDON, Nov. 16. Carl Blind writes to the Daily News declaring that all who care for England's interests ought to combine in demanding the release of Arabi, who, at first acted with the Khedive's consent and then upon the orders of an assembly of representatives of all classes of Egyptians.

The Times' Cairo correspondent says Suleiman Daud asks to be confronted with Arabi in public. He dares Arabi to deny the statements he made before the prosecution committee yesterday.

The Admiralty has received information from Egypt of the recovery of the despatch box of Prof. Palmer, who, with his party was murdered by Bedouins.

The third officer of the steamer Westphalia, who commanded the boat sent in search of the steamer which collided with the Westphalia, says the boat seen by the Channel pilot on Tuesday morning 20 miles from Beachy Head, cannot have been his. It may have been one belonging to the sunken steamer.

Dillon returned to Ireland yesterday. He proposes to temporarily resume his parliamentary duties.

The Daily News says the reported changes in the Cabinet are entirely conjectural. Gladstone has not opened the question of the reconstruction of the ministry.

A German steamer was wrecked off the coast, yesterday, and ten persons were drowned.

LEICESTER, Nov. 16. A banquet was given here last night to Sir Henry Haldor, captain of the rifle team which visited America. Responding to the toast to his health, Sir Henry said the recent rifle contest had brought together two armies and made friends of them. He proposed the health of the National Guard of America, which was drunk very cordially.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16. Fook Ah Hin, the Chinese merchant released from the steamship Coptic on habas corpus, states that the Chinese government refused to give certificates to its subjects other than laborers, as provided for by section six of the Act of Congress, known as the Chinese Immigration Act, which would entitle them to land in the United States. A brother of the Chinese interpreter of the United States Courts in this city has written a letter from China to the same effect.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 16. Various estates in the Finland Diet, except the present representatives, have petitioned the Czar to give permission, for the introduction next session of a bill granting full liberty to the press in Finland. They refer to the loyalty and tranquility of the Finns in support of their prayer.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 10. Sir Allen Young, the English Arctic navigator, has offered his services in connection with the proposed expedition to search for the missing exploring vessel Djmphna.

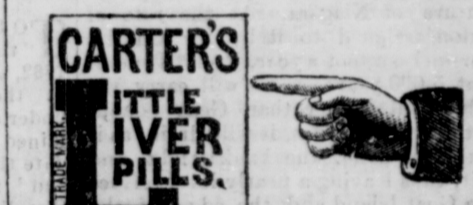
