

# Yvon Durelle Scores TKO Over Tinker Picot In 5th

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Tiresome Yvon Durelle of Bellefleur, N.B., scored a technical knockout over Tinker Picot of Dorchester, Mass., when the American fighter was unable to come out for the fifth round Thursday night.

A doctor was called to the ring and it was believed Picot had broken his right hand.

Durelle, Canadian light heavyweight champion fighting his 131st bout, gained a fourth-round technical knockout over Picot in a July meeting at Moncton when Picot twisted his knee.

Durelle started slowly and began to throw his looping overhead rights in the fourth round.

Picot opened fast but seemed to be tiring quickly as Durelle waded in foot-footed.

**DROPPED FOR NINE**  
Durelle's hardest punch was a right cross to the mid-section in the second round, dropping Picot to the canvas for a nine count. It was the only knockdown of the fight.

Both fighters appeared anxious to mix it up from the opening bell and concentrated on hard rights and lefts to the head.

Durelle weighed 180 and Picot 174.

Durelle predicted before the bout he would "start light night about he would 'start fighting in the fifth.'" He was unmarked after the rugged battle that saw the fighters twice wrestle to the canvas.

Durelle seemed to be feeling Picot out in the opening stanza, tossing right and left hooks to Picot's head when the Dorchester fighter moved within range.

**SOUGHT KNOCKOUT**  
The second round saw Picot move in on Durelle at the bell, throwing right and left hooks to the head, Durelle backed toward the ropes, then hurled a vicious right cross to the head and followed it with a right to the body. Both fighters continued throwing punches after the bell.

Picot rushed at Durelle at the opening of the third round, driving the champion into a neutral

corner, apparently trying for a knockout with driving rights and lefts to the head. Durelle banded himself out of trouble with his right hand to the head and heart, and a bruising right to the nose.

Durelle took his heaviest punishment of the fight from a pair of rights to the stomach in the fourth but countered with blows to the head.

Picot, seeking a win to offset his July defeat and better his record for a pair of New York bouts, appeared worn out after two rounds with the rock-like Durelle. Durelle has taken the full count only once, in a bout earlier this year against Floyd Patterson of New York.

One-third of Durelle's purse is being held by the Canadian Boxing Federation until Durelle settles a dispute with his manager, Harry Sheppard of Montreal.

**SUSPENSION RAISED**  
The agreement, reached last weekend, temporarily lifted an earlier CBF suspension order, allowing Durelle to make his first appearance here. About 3,000 fans cheered the fighters at the end of each round.

American fighters scored knock-out victories in two of four preliminary bouts.

Frank Lambert, 130, of New Bedford, Mass., dropped Leo Maliet, 138, of Saint John, at 2:58 of the second round in a scheduled four-rounder.

Bob Barrett, 122, of New York knocked out Tiger Pyle, 125, of Moncton with a left to the jaw at 1:22 of the second stanza in a six-round semi-final.

Normie Gautreau, of Moncton weathered a sixth round rally to back up a split decision over Joe Walker of Boston. Both weighed 150.

In a four-round preliminary, Paul Anderson, 140, of Moncton decided KO Roberts of Parkton, N.B.

## Reds Poor Relations But Having Wonderful Time

NEW YORK (AP)—Birdie Tebbetts likes his Cincinnati Reds to be poor relations who invited themselves to a party—and had a wonderful time.

The articulate Redleg manager chuckled heartily when asked in a telephone conversation Thursday what the three victories in four games with league-leading Milwaukee meant to Cincinnati.

"It means," replied Birdie, "that the leading lady has found herself a new leading man. Up to now it always has been either Milwaukee or Brooklyn that had every dance. Now they find somebody else cutting in and if they don't watch out the dance will be over and they'll be left holding each other's hands."

Birdie couldn't be blamed for feeling chipper about things Thursday. Not since June, when his Redlegs occupied first place for a few fleeting moments, have they enjoyed such a lofty position. Their three straight triumphs in Milwaukee have elevated them into second place only 1 1/2 games behind the Braves. Brooklyn trails them by a half game.

**CONVINCED SKEPTICS**  
"I think we've finally convinced the skeptics we have a chance," Birdie said. "They've got to admit now it's a three-team race and we have a chance. Up to now nobody ever mentioned us. Well, the ugly ducklings have invited themselves into a party."

Tebbetts said that the fact that the Reds have been overlooked has worked to their advantage. "I think it was a wonderful break for us," he said. "There was no pressure on us. Everybody was relaxed. There was no reason to tighten up. Nobody gave us a chance anyway. We just went along like poor relations."

Cincinnati still has 20 games to play to tie for Brooklyn and Milwaukee. A majority of them are on the road but that isn't worrying Tebbetts.

### Thinks Dodgers Not The Team That Won In 1955

NEW YORK (AP)—Like the guy who ran after a girl until she caught him, there seems to be a question as to whether Milwaukee Braves and Cincinnati Reds rate the credit for overtaking Brooklyn Dodgers this year or the Dodgers have dropped back and allowed themselves to be caught.

The current Bums certainly aren't the team that finished 13 games in front in 1955. They blame their troubles on lack of hitting, and hitting obviously has been one of their problems. They also blame generally erratic pitching.

In fact, they blame just about everything, and everything has been a contributory factor, but most of the woes can be traced to a common basis, to wit: The Dodgers suddenly have been taken old.

**MAY COME TRUE**  
Not in every position, but in enough key spots to affect the play of the entire team.

So the Dodgers finally may make the experts look good. For years the critics have been predicting the club was too old to have another championship season.

They still may make it, calling on some hidden store of energy, but it would be a minor miracle. The Braves and Redlegs are kids compared to the venerable Bums. The average age of the eight Brooklyn regulars is 31.7 years. Milwaukee and Cincinnati each averages 26.6, or more than five years less than the world champions.

Here is the way the three contenders stack up from the age standpoint:

Brooklyn: C—Campanella 34; 1B—Hodges 32; 2B—Gilliam 27; 3B—Robinson 37; SS—Reese 37; LF—Armstrong 24; CF—Snider 29; RF—Furillo 34.

Milwaukee: C—Grandall 25; 1B—Adeock 28; 2B—O'Connell 27; 3B—Mathews 24; SS—Logan 29; LF—Thomson 32; CF—Bruton 26; RF—Aaron 22.

Cincinnati: C—Bailey 25; 1B—Kluszewski 32; 2B—Temple 27; 3B—Grammas 28; SS—McMillan 26; LF—Robinson 21; CF—Bell 27; RF—Post 27.

Five of the Dodgers are in their 30s. The Braves and Redlegs each have only one in the 30 bracket.

Now it is admitted that some ball players in their mid-30s are better than some in their 20s ever will be.

But on the whole a team of players in their 20s will outlast a team of older players over a season and be playing better ball at the finish.

This month should verify that theory, or else prove it false. At any rate, this is the Dodgers' last chance with the team as it now stands.

The big names of the tennis world including Australia's Lew Hoad, Ham Richardson of the U.S. and Sven Davidson of Sweden, are playing in the United States amateur and won't arrive until Monday.
