## Hilda Becomes Biggest Storm

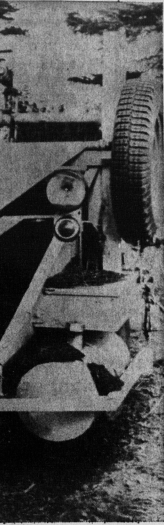
