DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The King's County Election Case.

OTTAWA, March 10. A number of Private Bills were introduced yesterday. Mr. John McDonald drew attention to the King's County Election Case, and moved that it be referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

A Steamer and 65 Lives Lost.

LONDON, March 10. The iron screw steamer "Navarre," 685 tons, owned by the Leith, Hull, and Hamburg Packet Co., while on passage from Copenhagen to Leith, foundered in a gale on Tuesday last. Sixty-five persons perished.

Frank Byrne Released.

PARIS, March 10. Frank Byrne, supposed to be "Number One," was examined before the Tribunal yesterday. He proved an alibi and was released.

Proceedings Against Sheridan Withdrawn.

NEW YORK, March 10. The extradition proceedings against P. J. Sheridan have been withdrawn.

Telegraph Notes.

The Prince of Wales has been created Field Marshal of the German Empire.

The bullion withdrawn from the Bank of England, on the 7th, was £1,000,000.

Worthing Park, England, the country seat of the Earl of Strafford, has been burned.

Mr. Lichter, cotton manufacturer, of Boston, England, has failed. Liabilities \$300,000.

The authorities in Schleswig have commenced to expel Danes for refusing to serve in the army.

Two vessels have been wrecked at Scherpeningen, Holland. Fourteen persons were drowned.

Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia has started for Damascus and other places in the Holy Land.

United States Treasurer Gillfillan has resigned. Assistant Treasurer Wyman is likely to succeed him.

There is great disappointment at Bradford, England, among merchants and manufacturers with regard to the new tariff laws just enacted by the United States Congress.

It is reported that the French Government have determined to suppress a socialistic demonstration which is advertised to occur on the Esplanade des Invalides, Paris, on Friday.

General Blumenthal, commander of the fourth army corps, has been appointed German Minister of War. The Emperor was very unwilling to part with General Von Kameke's services.

It is reported that great distress prevails in County Mayo. Over thirty persons are in the Poor House suffering from famine and fever. There are 700 names on the list of persons needing relief.

It is reported that owing to representations on the part of Great Britain, Maceo, the Cuban ringleader, has been removed from Pampunco to Centa, his health having suffered at the former place.

Returns issued by the Board of Trade show that during February British imports increased, compared with that month last year, by \$3,887,000, and the exports during the same period decreased \$245,000.

At a fire in Cambridge Plats, N. Y., on the 7th inst., Mrs. Wakeman and daughter, who occupied the fourth floor, were suffocated. The building was damaged to the amount of \$70,000; furniture, \$50,000.

The Society for the Suppression of Blasphemous Literature propose to get up cases against Profs. Huxley and Tyndall, Herbert Spencer, the publishers of John Stuart Mill's works, John Morley and others.

It is stated that Prince Gortschakoff's illness is due to a recent attempt to poison him. After severe vomiting, last week, the doctors discovered traces of phosphorus. The police are making an investigation.

At the Lapastoria rancho, near Ures, on the 4th, a band of fifty Apaches killed all the people except one woman. They also killed a mule driver on the road to the rancho. Near Vallecitos they attacked a family and killed two persons.

A severe gale, accompanied by snow, prevailed for twenty hours on the British Coast, commencing on the 6th. Two vessels and three men have been lost at Dundee; three vessels at Scarborough, one at the Isle of Man, and two lives at Whitstable.

The body of Jim Elliott, the prize fighter killed in Chicago by Jesse Dunn, arrived at New York on the 7th. The funeral will take place on Sunday, and it is expected that it will be one of the largest that has taken place in New York for years, and will be attended by sporting men from all parts of the United States.

The Chamber of Deputies, Bucharest, have passed a bill providing for the expenditure of 15,000,000 lei for the erection of forts, many necessary by the political situation.

The Prime Minister said the sole object of the construction of new forts was to guarantee the neutrality of Roumania.

The North German Gazette has published a strong article pointing out that Prussia has allowed the natives of Schleswig, who chose to adopt the Danish nationality, to return to their homes; if they were further allowed the option of avoiding military service, everybody in Schleswig would nominally become a Dane.

Trade between Germany and Italy is growing so fast that the St. Gothard Railway Co. is running extra trains. The increase in traffic is mostly in coal and iron. Smuggling, however, is increasing more rapidly than trade, and is conducted by a gang of Swiss and Italians, who, when arrested, pay fines from a common fund. They are aided in their operations by trained dogs.

A legitimist meeting was held in Lille, France, at which 5,000 persons were present. MM. Bandy d'Asson, Deputy, and Barbes delivered addresses in which they violently attacked the Republic. A resolution was unanimously adopted pledging all persons present to support the Royalist cause in the coming struggle. The principle importance to be attached to the affair is that it will possibly cause prosecutions.

Most intense excitement continues to be felt among Europeans in Calcutta, because of the proposed law giving native magistrates criminal jurisdiction over the whites in certain cases. A correspondent says he is certain, from inquiry, that if the obnoxious measure is pressed, ninety per cent. of the white volunteers in Bengal would resign as a protest against it. At a great meeting held at Calcutta, even violence toward native magistrates was threatened.

The statistical agent of the United States Department of Agriculture in London, reports continued rains and floods, great injury to the wheat crop and gloomy apprehensions of the worst failure for years. The area is reduced and much re-sowing will be necessary. There is also much alarm at the spread of foot and mouth disease among cattle. Local fairs throughout Great Britain have been closed and orders in Council prohibit the movement of farm animals from Scotland to Ireland until the 31st March.

In a speech at the Emmett celebration in Cooper Institute, New York, ex-State Senator Ecclesine said: "We shall continue to instil venom in every land against the plunderers of the world. England is an empire of jobbers. It is the duty of all Irishmen in this country to bring about war between the United States and Great Britain. (Cheers.) Put Irishmen into high places; into State Legislatures; into national offices; into the Cabinet of the United States, and they will do their work well. All we ask is for our adopted country to sanction our cause, and we will do all the work. Do you remember the fisheries trouble in Canada. These outrages can be made cause for war. The English Government will be as long subduing us as it will be in discovering the name of 'Number One.' But we are against private assassination. Our cause is just, and all we ask is a fair fight and an open field. English statesmen boast what they are going to do. I should like to see them extradite Sheridan."

The annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held at Ottawa, on the 7th inst. A vote of thanks was tendered to the Governor-General and Princess Louise for the prizes they had offered and the interest His Excellency had evinced in the success of the Association. His Excellency replied in a speech in which he promised to continue to take an interest in the Association, and expressed the hope that Col. Gzowski would be re-elected President. He hoped a shield valued at £100 would be offered for competition at the prize meeting of 1883 by the auxiliary forces, as a mark of esteem towards their Canadian brethren. He would again appeal to institutions and other corporations to assist in swelling the prize list, and expressed the belief that every father and mother in the Dominion, as a duty to the State, should contribute their mite towards successfully carrying out the objects of the Association. He made a complimentary reference to the military schools and colleges of the Dominion, and pointed out their usefulness in teaching men to lead the forces should an emergency arise. It was decided that all parties contributing less than \$40 or more than \$5 to the prize list shall be entitled to membership during the year the contribution is made. All the old officers were re-elected.
