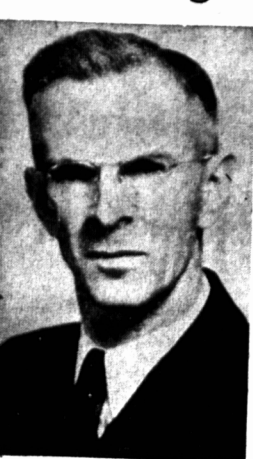

Induction Service At Tryon Tuesday Evening

The new pastor of the Tryon United Baptist Pastoral Charge, the Rev. Lindsay R. Graves, will be inducted to office Tuesday evening, December 4th, at a special service in the Tryon United Baptist Church at 8 o'clock. The service will be conducted by the Moderator of the Prince Edward Island Association of Baptist churches, Mr. Charles Scerranton, assisted by Rev. Keith R. Hobson, Dr. C.A. Britten, Rev. Owen Cochran, and Rev. H. L. Mitton.

The pastor-elect comes to the Tryon field from the West Yorkmouth United Baptist Church of Chegoquin, Ontario, having served that field successfully for a period of five years. Mr. Graves previously served two other pastorates in Nova Scotia, and two in New Brunswick.

He received his elementary training in Lawrencetown, N.S., following graduation from the High School he taught school in Nova Scotia for two years. He was licensed to preach by the Lawrence-town United Baptist Church in 1924. He attended Acadia University, and later enrolled as a student in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, in Louisville, Kentucky, being ordained to the Christian Ministry in 1931.

Well Known Granville Man Dies Suddenly

The death of a man Taylor of Granville in his 64th year, occurred suddenly in Prince County Hospital last evening.

Mr. Taylor, widely known throughout the province entered hospital on Thursday.

Born at North Granville, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Taylor, he was a veteran of the First World War, serving overseas with Headquarters Staff for four years.

Mr. Taylor for seventeen years represented International Harvesting Company, before founding Island Equipment Company in Summerside, which he operated for three years.

Suffering a heart condition four years ago, Mr. Taylor retired from active work, and was in poor health in recent months.

Together with his wife, the former Mrs. Silliphant of Hunter River who survives him, Mr. Taylor had for the past few years been residing at his home in Granville during the summer moving to Summerside for the winter months.

Mr. Taylor was a member of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion, a past president and member of the Summerside Rotary Club, and a member of the Masonic Lodge at Stanley Bridge.

The funeral will be held on Sunday at 2 p.m. in Granville.

N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK (A)—The stock market prices rose vigorously Friday in the only advance of the week. Leading issues forged gains running to 5 to 6 points or more.

The market was higher from the start, continuing the advance on Thursday's technical recovery. It was pushed further when Bethlehem Steel surged ahead on news of its 4-for-1 stock split which came after Thursday's close.

Oils were propelled ahead in mid-season when Washington ordered into effect the emergency program to supply Western Europe with up to 1,100,000 barrels of oil daily because of the Suez Canal blockage.

The Associated reas average of 60 stocks rose \$1.80 to \$175.20. Volume totalled 2,300,000 shares.

Bethlehem was the day's most active stock, 70 5/8 at 177 1/2 on 86,200 shares.

Second most active was Sperry Rand, unchanged at 22 on 27,600 shares. Third was U.S. Steel, up 1 1/2 at 60 1/2 on 27,300 shares.

Next came Standard Oil (New Jersey) up 1/4 at 56 1/2 and General Motors, up 3/4 at 43 1/2.

On the New York exchange, Canadian issues were higher. International Nickel was up 3 1/2, McAlister was up 1/2 also. Fracintyre Porcupine rose 1/4 and tonally higher were Canadian Pacific, Distillers - Seagram, Dome Mines and Granby Mining.

The American stock exchange was higher on volume of 930,000 shares. Shawinigan rose 3 while conl, Eureka, Preston East Dome and Jupiter Oils were fractionally ahead.

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—Industrial stocks closed with gains ranging to more than a point in active dealings Friday on the Montreal and Canadian exchanges.

International paced papers, gain 4 1/2. Consolidated improved three and St. Lawrence Corporation climbed 1 1/2. In base metals, International Nickel jumped three while Aluminium and Hudson Bay improved a point.

Refining oils moved up as International Petroleum added 2 1/2 and B.A. advanced 1 1/2. Interprovincial Pipe Lines went ahead two points in Algonia and Toronto-Dominion in banks were point winners.

Shawinigan led utilities, advancing 1 1/2 while Walker jumped 2 1/2 in beverages. Among miscellaneous Industrial acceptance lost a point while Canadian Industries and Dominion Stores dipped 1/2.

Mines shared in the general advance as Club Jacquet climbed 30 cents and Virginia gained 21. Merrill Island, Monty, Quebec Copper and ouzan moved up 15.

Industrial volume was 146,900 shares, mines 749,700.

The exchanges' closing average show banks up 0.19 at 50.28, utilities up 1.3 at 132.4, industrials up 1.2 at 276.9, combined up 1.2 at 228.7, papers up 46.08 at 1325.06 and golds up 0.85 at 70.49.

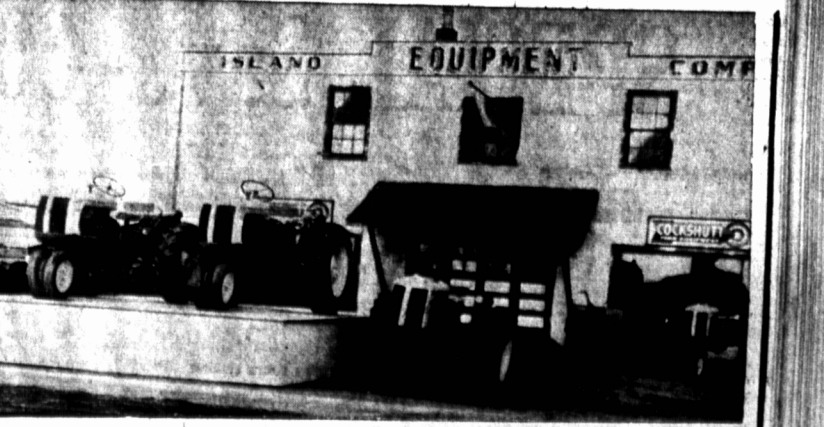
