NORTH: ♠K 9 5, ♥Q 5 2, ♦S 4, ♣A K 8 5 3. WEST: ♠Q 5 4, ♥J 10 9, ♦K 10 7 6 2, ♣7 6 4. EAST: ♠J 10 7 2, ♥J 8 6 3, ♦A Q 3, ♣9 2. SOUTH: ♠A 8 3, ♥A K 7 4, ♦J 9 8, ♣Q J 10.

The bidding: North East South West 1♠ Pass 1♥ Pass 2♥ Pass 4♥

Opening lead—ten of hearts.

Thus, if declarer immediately draws three rounds of trumps and runs the club suit in an attempt to shake the losing diamond. East will ruff the third club in time to cash three diamond tricks for a one trick set.

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Opposes "Shot-gun" Therapy Of Fevers With Antibiotics

MONTREAL (CP) — A Western Canada medical authority today criticized what he called "the shot-gun therapy of fevers with antibiotics."

Dr. Lennox G. Bell, dean of medicine at the University of Manitoba, spoke of fevers and diagnoses at the scientific meeting of the College of General Practice of Canada.

Dr. Bell told the family doctors that administration of antibiotics before cause of the disease has been determined makes it difficult later to determine the exact germ responsible. Every effort should be made to isolate the offending organism before treatment is begun.

Some fevers defied diagnosis for weeks or months. Some patients run a low fever for months or years. "They seem to have the body thermostat set at a higher level than normal and the resulting slight fever is not significant."

He said prolonged fever of obscure origin is not uncommon and constitutes one of the most challenging and exasperating problems met with in practice.

Tremendous advances in treating many diseases made it "doubtful" to diagnose the cause of every fever accurately in order to provide precise treatment.

Dr. Bell conceded that the "shot-gun therapy" often works but said it may mask the real cause of the fever and thus produce serious results.

Neomycin has been found of real value in treatment, said Dr. Medovy. In any outbreak, all infants exposed to a case of epidemic diarrhoea should be treated since some may be carriers.

Dr. Medovy said doctors should stress the importance of immunization programs for diphtheria and make sure booster doses are given at two, four and six years of age and at three-year intervals thereafter until children are at least 15.

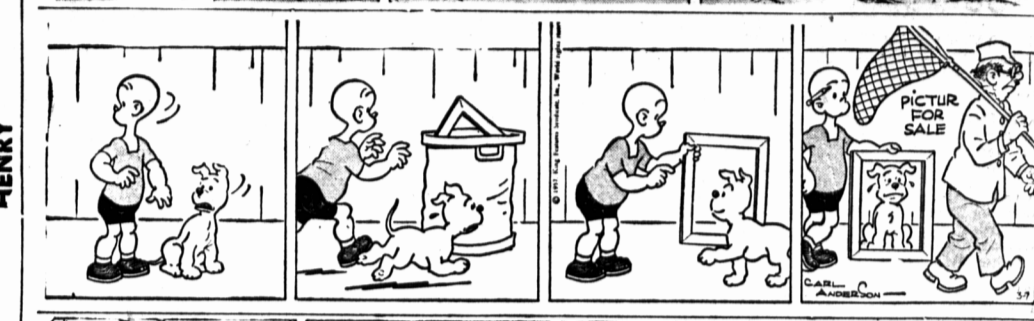
Since dates and types of inoculation are often forgotten by parents, Dr. Medovy suggested every child wear an identifying tag, ring or bracelet showing a record of immunizations.

Dr. Harry Medovy, chief child specialist at Winnipeg Children's Hospital, reported that epidemic diarrhoea among newborn children has been traced to specific strains of bacteria. Through improved bacteriological methods it is often possible to trace this often fatal disorder among infants to a single type of germ.
