

Local and Other Items.

J. E. Boyd, Esq., has returned from St. John.

The steamer *Gulnare* sailed for the Labrador yesterday.

The "L. J. Westaway" arrived at Bristol on the 25th inst.—all well.

ALEX. MACNAE, Superintendent of P. E. I. Railway was in St. John, N. B., on Monday.

It is estimated that the export of sugar from Barbadoes will be 90,000 hogheads this season.

The Government shooting match, by the members of Major Pollard's Co., is in progress at Kensington to-day.

REMEMBER the sale of new Furniture advertised by A. McNeill, Auctioneer, to-morrow, at 2 o'clock, at his Auction Rooms.

BUSINESS at the wharves of Montreal has never been so good as at present. An immense number of steamers and sailing vessels are taking in cargo, and the demand is for more.

REV. H. C. HOVY, of New Haven, corresponding Editor of the "Scientific American," and of the "Sea World," New York, is at present on a visit to this Province. He is staying at the "Revere."

PATRICK KAVANAGH, who stole a number of implements from the warehouse of Mr. James Dover, recently, was sentenced by the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day, to three weeks imprisonment with hard labor.

The yachts *Carita*, *Clarebel*, *Emma* and the South Shore ferry boat, started from Pownal wharf at three o'clock to-day on a race around St. Peter's Island buoy. The race will probably finish at 7 o'clock.

The United States, apparently, had a taste of Vennor's cold wave. It came on the 22nd, and New Yorkers, who had been vainly trying to sleep in the open air, felt very comfortable in beds. The thermometer went down to the vicinity of 60°.

Toronto bricklayers receive \$2.50 per day. Buffalo bricklayers only receive \$2.00 per day and are to strike for \$2.50. It is a proof of the prosperity now existing in Canada that this important element in the building trade is in receipt of higher wages in Toronto than across the line.—*Times*.

The barkentine "Brema," McMahon, with a cargo of 2,165 boxes preserved lobsters, shipped by John Hughes, and 3,500 pieces deals and exds, containing 234,000 feet, superficial measurement, and 1 case and 1 parcel returned goods, shipped by Peake Bros. & C., sailed for Liverpool, G. B., on the 27th inst.

On Friday Chief Power was drowned near St. Boniface, Manitoba, by Mike Carroll, an escaped convict. The latter had escaped from the penitentiary and was recaptured by Power. In crossing the river in a boat, Carroll capsized it, and although handcuffed, it is said, swam ashore. Carroll formerly lived in Ottawa, and was a desperate character.

A WINDFALL.—Wm. Corlin, a young man in moderate circumstances, in Philadelphia, has received intelligence that he has fallen heir to a 40 million estate of an uncle. The testator, Alfred Corlin, was the king of Australian stock breeders, and a conspicuous witness for the claimant to the Tichborne estate, having had Arthur Orton for a long time in his employ.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.—The Quebec Chronicle states that immediately after the embarkation, next Saturday, at Rimouski, of H. R. E. Prince Leopold, and H. R. H. Princess Louise, His Excellency the Governor General and Staff will embark on board the Government steamer *Druid*, and proceed direct to the Lower Provinces. His Excellency will be absent about a fortnight, and will probably visit, on his way down, the most important lighthouses and fog signals in the Gulf.

The market to-day was well attended. On the stall of Mr. Dawson were exhibited some very fine samples of peas and cauliflowers, while Mr. Gay showed good samples of all kinds of vegetables. Prices were as follows: Beef (small) from 6 to 14 cts. per lb.; beef (qr.) from 5 to 9 cents per lb.; mutton, from 10 to 12 cents per lb.; lamb, per lb., from 6 to 10 cents; chickens, per pair, from 40 to 50 cents; butter from 15 to 20 cents per lb.; eggs from 10 to 13 cents per dozen; peas, per qr., from 12 to 20 cents.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, July 25.

The Viceroy of India has received the following despatch:—

CAP KUSHKI NAKAD, Candahar, July 22.

Spies report that Ayoub Khan has crossed Helmand at Hyderabad. It is reported that 4,000 Ghazis have joined Ayoub. Parties of his cavalry are foraging near the British camp.

A correspondent at St. Petersburg reports that Admiral Leosofsky has received full powers to reopen negotiations with China.

A despatch from Dublin says the weather continues very fine. All the crops are maturing with unusual rapidity. In view of this some of the members of the Mansion House relief committee consider their labors ought to be ended immediately.

Despatches from Vienna state that the Powers will draw up an ultimatum summoning the Porte to fulfil, within three weeks, the Montenegro convention, and in the event of a refusal, a naval demonstration will take place.

The *Daily News* despatch from Madrid says the total loss of life by the earthquake at Manilla is estimated at 320, including 200 Chinamen; almost every family is houseless.

The *Daily News* Paris despatch says such demonstrations in behalf of Henri Rochefort as were made at the students' soiree on Saturday, do not cause the slightest excitement here.

NAPLES, July 25.

A sharp shock of earthquake was felt here to-day.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 24.

The Montenegrin agent has departed.

CAPE TOWN, July 23.

Tito Assembly has negated the motion of want of confidence in the Ministry.

CARLE, July 24.

It is believed that a meeting of the British and Abdur Rahman Khan will shortly be arranged near Cabul. The religious ceremony on his proclamation as Ameer was witnessed by large crowds. The people profess satisfaction.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 24.

It is difficult to explain the crime of Ouzatis as he was a man of property. None of the victim's money was found on him. Ouzatis tried to obtain a post under Skubeloff in the Turcoman expedition, but failed. This may be one reason for the crime.

LONDON, July 24.

At the inquiry into the identity of Ben d' Or, yesterday, the Duke of Westminster was examined. Peck, the Newmarket trainer, and others positively asserted the animal was not Tadcaster.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 25.

The Porte is trying to place the responsibilities of rejecting the decision of the Berlin Conference of the grand councils, but the ambassadors have intimated to the Sultan that he alone is responsible. In the meantime the troops and stores are being hurried to Albania.

NEW YORK, July 25.

Up to 8 this evening there was no visible change in Dr. Tanner's condition. He did not go for his usual morning's ride, was in good spirits, and seemed quite strong. At noon he commenced the twenty-seventh day of his fast.

Thomas Barr, mate of the schooner E. A. Merritt, states that the schooner was less than a league from Cuba when hailed by the Spanish cruiser, and instead of coming to the schooner crowded all sail to escape the bother of being overhauled and then the Spaniard fired.

It is announced that Gen. Hancock's letter of acceptance will be given to the public next Wednesday.

Under orders from Gen. Grant, commander-in-chief, the "Boys in Blue" are being organized for a Republican political campaign.

The "Herald" states that a grand Republican ratification meeting is projected for this city, at which Grant will preside and Conkling and others will speak. The programme is to give Grant a monster reception under the auspices of the State and National committees, with an immense torchlight procession, etc.

It is stated that the Grand Jury Committee on the Seawanhaka disaster have discovered through an examination by experts, that one of her boilers burst, causing a fracture in the furnace, and the subsequent fire. A presentation by the Grand Jury to this effect will be made.

Mr. Redpath emphatically states that there is no need of further American contributions to Ireland. The potato crop is ripe, and their is no apprehension of a blight spreading.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 25.

Slow progress was made on coit work at the tunnel to-day. The pile drivers were in operation all Saturday night, but early this morning one of the engines was disabled. The shaft was entirely cleared of water at one o'clock this morning, and two stationary engines at its bottom were set to work to pumping out the water, which had leaked through a dead-eye in the head of the air lock. This afternoon a delegation from Lincoln Lodge, Knights of Pythias, visited the shaft, saying they had received a telegram from Hector Lodge, No. 49, Philadelphia, requesting them to take charge of the remains of assistant superintendent, one of the victims, when found.

CINCINNATI, O., July 25.

John King, a laborer ordered Paul Smith (colored) away from an unfrequented street in the suburbs, this afternoon, on the ground that he had been committing a nuisance. A fight ensued, and Smith actually choked King to death.

COLUMBUS, Ind., July 25.

In a quarrel last night between Nichols and Zeigler, the latter was struck over the head with a billiard cue and died this morning.

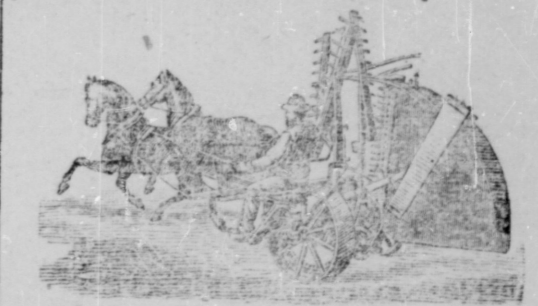
