Wheat Sales Continue Slow

By SYDNEY CAMPBELL LONDON, (Reuters) — Business under the new International Wheat Agreement seems to go from bad to worse.

The sales for the week ending August 28 totalled only 2,091,000 bushels, something like a mere 12 per cent of what they were at the same time last year.

A jacket of Norwegian blue fox fur is being featured in New York and is being sold at \$49.50 wholesale.

The first public auction of chinchilla pelts since 1946 will be held at one of the New York auction houses late in the spring of 1954.

Canada, holding out for the agreement's maximum price of \$2.05 a bushel, sold only 110,000 bushels in the week ending Aug. 28.
