Panel Discussion Features Electrical League Show

The Electric Service League of this province held its first Electrical Show last evening in the auditorium of Prince of Wales College.

Sponsored as one of its public service features, the "Evening of Information for the Home Owner" was well attended, and proved of great benefit to all those interested in improving their standard of living, electrically.

A feature of the evening was a panel discussion, chaired by A. D. Cameron, general manager of Maritime Electric Co. Ltd., with members of the panel including Keith Pickard, architect; Willard Burke, electrical contractor; J.L. Kirby, electrical inspector, and Jack Carr, journeyman.

Premier Labels Report 'Disaster'

The report from Ottawa that the federal government has decided against buying the Vacationland for the Borden to Tormentine ferry service has been described as a "disaster" for Prince Edward Island.

Premier A.W. Matheson says if the report is true, it is "the greatest disaster that the transportation service between this province and the mainland has suffered since the sinking of the SS Charlottetown 17 years ago."

The Canadian Press report from Ottawa says the government after a thorough investigation of the Lake Michigan ferry Vacationland has decided that she would not be suitable for the Northumberland Strait crossing. The report adds that it would cost a million dollars to put the vessel in condition for the service in addition to its capital cost. The owners have been asking \$3,000,000 for the ferry. The report says the federal government is considering the construction of a new ferry.

The Premier said he would await with interest some official statement from the federal government. He said he hoped it would not be delayed as in the case of the causeway report.

At the present time the ferry service is faced with a normal increase in traffic between Prince Edward Island and the mainland and the approach of another busy tourist season.

BAIT SHORTAGE FOUGHT

A growing scarcity of herring bait has forced Island lobstermen to travel far afield in search of an adequate substitute. Yesterday some 20 fishermen from the Egmont Bay district were netting gaspereaux in the waters off the North River Causeway. A half-dozen gravel trucks were

on hand to transport the bony catch westward. Bait was said to be scarce in the Alberton and Tignish districts. E. M. Gorman, deputy minister of fisheries, said that researchers so far had been unable to determine why the early summer herring catch had fallen off so noticeably

in the past few years. It was possible that the National Research Council would send experts to investigate the situation this summer, he added.

A share of the dairy market in Charlottetown and vicinity is being sought by Amalgamated Dairies Limited, a Prince County Co-operative firm with headquarters in Summerside.

Ray Hambly, Norwood Road, has been named manager of the Charlottetown branch office located at 130 Great George St.

Mr. Hambly said last night that a refrigerated truck would be used to service customers with such company products as frozen foods, ice cream, cheeses and butter.

At present the new territory would be confined to Charlottetown and the immediately adjoining districts, the local manager added.
