Wages are booming among lumber laborers on the Ottawa.

The yield of this year's sugar crop in West Indies has been about 545,400 tons, against 680,000 tons last year, showing a decrease of about 20 per cent.

Boston is the sixth city in the Union in point of population. In 1860 it was the fifth, and in 1870 the seventh. It passed ahead of Cincinnati in the last decade.

The construction of the Panama Canal is now said to be assured. If the scheme fails it will not be on account of a scarcity of money among capitalists of the old world and the new.

Says an Independent paper: 'Pompous pride goes before a political fall, as a certain candidate for the Presidency will discover next November.' This is a very safe prediction. We, ourselves, think somebody will be beaten.

The Democratic factions in New York State appear to have composed their quarrels and to be rallying cordially in support of Hancock, and if the reality accord with the appearance, the Empire State will surely go Democratic in the Presidential contest.

The French Government has decided to send to Canada a special commission, M. Lalonde, whose duty will be to report on the agricultural resources, and climatology of this country.—There can be no doubt that Canada as a field for emigrants, is attracting general attention in Europe.

Timber men are experiencing some difficulty in getting men at Ottawa this season owing to the large number who have gone to Michigan during the past year. Log makers who were glad to take from \$15 to \$18 per month are now asking from \$25 to \$30 a month; and road cutters from \$12 to \$15.

It is recorded of a Parisienne at Trouville this season that she changed her dress nine times a day! First she donned a breakfast gown, then a walking dress, then a bathing costume, then another walking dress, and after that a yachting toilet. That makes five. The four others were a tea gown, a dinner dress, a casino costume, and a ninth and last very careful toilet for a select little supper and card party.

The Governor General's movements, so far as arranged, will be as follows:—The Governor General is to give a hop at the Quebec Citadel next week, after H. M. S. Northampton arrives. His Excellency goes to Ottawa to present the Dominion Rifle Association prizes on the 9th September. He will subsequently return to Quebec, and leave for Montreal on Tuesday morning, the 21st of September. On Friday the 24th of September, he will arrive at Hamilton.

The first railroad opened in Japan was that from Yokohama to Tokio, complete in 1875. Since then this railroad has been extended to several other roads, from Tokio to Myabasia, will soon be opened. Telegraph lines follow the course of the railroads, and cables connect the several islands of which the empire is composed. There is now in process of construction a cable to the island of Loo-Choo, an island whose ownership is a matter of dispute between China and Japan.

Von Moltke is now living on his country estate where his young wife was buried, and is very busy in writing his history of the late war. Though he delights in his rural pursuits and in solitude, he is no recluse; he takes a lively interest in the welfare of his tenantry, and is always kind, generous and sympathetic with them. 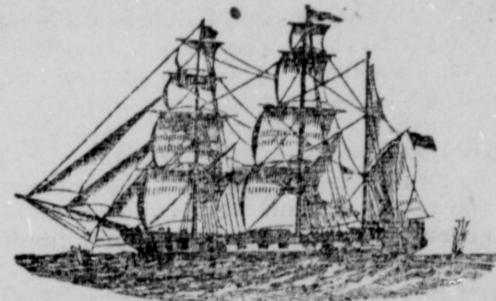
