'Tunnel Of Love' One Of Funniest

Laughing and applauding frequently, a large audience at Confederation Centre Saturday night expressed its pleasure at Neptune Theatre Company's presentation of the three-act comedy "Tunnel of Love."

Written by Peter DeVries and Joseph Fields this contemporary play has got to be one of the funniest ever seen in these parts. It concerns a young couple hoping desperately for a child and how they eventually agree adoption is the answer.

The problems arise when the adopted child turns out to be hubby's own illegitimate son from a one-night affair with a social worker from the adoption agency.

Eric Donkin played the mild and harmless husband who would have done nothing wrong had it not been for some ideas planted in his mind by his playboy friend, David Renton.

The calibre of acting was not as high as in the previous night's production "As You Like It." But the excellence of the play itself more than compensated for any minor failings.

TOO INVOLVED
Mr. Donkin handled the role of Angie Poole extremely well. But Roberta Maxwell as his wife seemed to become too involved in her accent thereby overshadowing her acting and leaving the audience too aware of the phony voice. She also made a slip, unusual for her, by calling her husband Dick, the name of the next-door neighbor.

As the playboy, Mr. Renton didn't quite ring true at times although, for the most part he did reach a convincing note. Milo Ringham as his wife was a little flat in the first scene but more than made up for it from then on.

Perhaps the reason for these impressions was the play of the previous night. The roles in "As You Like It" were so well handled it was difficult to adjust to seeing the same people in such completely different parts.

Joan Gregson and Muriel White the remaining two in the cast of "Tunnel of Love," handled their small roles quite capably.

The overall impression of the play, however, was one of extreme delight and enjoyment. It ended Neptune's season and heralded the beginning of the fall festival at Confederation Centre. Next come the Halifax Symphony and Ian and Sylvia.

Mrs. Wadds Here Tuesday

Mrs. Jean Wadds, Conservative MP for Grenville Dundas in the last parliament, will arrive in Charlottetown Tuesday evening for several speaking engagements on behalf of Conservative candidates here.

Mrs. Wadds, the former Jean Casselman, has represented the Ontario riding since the death of her husband in 1958. Mrs. Casselman had been the member for the riding prior to his death.

On Wednesday evening she will speak at a meeting in Victoria being held by Heath MacQuarrie and J. Angus MacLean, Conservative teammates in the local riding in Queens. Earlier in the day she will be guest of honor at two teas being held by the ladies of the Conservative team. She will be at a tea being held at the Charlottetown Legion from four o'clock until six and will attend a tea in Summerside from two o'clock until three. She will appear on television on Wednesday evening.

In addition to her duties as the representative for Grenville — Dundas, Mrs. Wadds was the first woman to be named a parliamentary secretary when she

took the post of secretary to the minister of health and welfare in 1962. She was also on the Canadian delegation to the United Nations in 1961.

She also has the distinction of being the first woman to sit in the Commons with her father, Earl Rowe, who represented the riding of Dufferin-Simcoe for many years.

Mrs. Wadds, 48, mother of two children, has been re-elected in every subsequent election since her first election in 1958. An article in Weekend Magazine this week includes a picture and short article on Mrs. Wadds.

Harry Hays formula under which this fair is conducted calls for all of the steers to be registered animals, something virtually unknown in the past for steer competition.

The MacDonald steer was born June 3, 1964 so that he just got under the age limit which is 17 months. His exact weight is 1,142 pounds. Mr. MacDonald told The Guardian. He was the heaviest steer in the show. Fulton Sanderson's biggest Hereford weighed 1,110 pounds. So the Island also had the two largest steers.

Other Islanders who had good steers in the unusually strong class included Frank Mutch, Cherry Valley; Robert MacLauren, Belmont Lot 15—he had the grand champion at the Charlottetown Easter Beef Show a few years ago; James A. MacDonald, Hunter River; Robert Sanderson, York Point and Alton Younger, Winsloe.

The Younker steer was the reserve Shorthorn champion, though he finished out of the money.

The champion Shorthorn of the show was shown by R.C. Acton and Sons.

The Sanderson steer that was fourth was the reserve Hereford champion.

The Spence steer was the top Hereford. And the two top Angus steers topped the big class.

Likable Judge Bill Bennett observed with a grin after the show that he has the two roughest judging chores this time. The 24-steer show was tough and today he has to judge the interbreed best added class. That's one on which he can't win, no matter what breed he selects for top honors, the other breeds will not appreciate his choice.

Town Quiet On Hallowe'en

SUMMERSIDE — RCMP Detachments as well as Town Police here reported one of the quietest Hallowe'ens in many years.

Except for a couple of haystacks burnt in Kinkora and a plate glass window being broken at the Carleton White Rose Service Station, there was little other damage reported by the other RCMP detachments.

There was only one accident reported on the weekend and this was investigated by the Borden Detachment.

The accident occurred at 4:15 Saturday morning when a car driven by Frederick Elmer Dickieson of Hampton went out of control on the Trans-Canada Highway at Hampton and smashed into a hydro pole. Damage to the vehicle was estimated at \$600. Neither the driver or two other passengers were injured.

Here the Town Police reported a quiet night with only a few window panes in houses broken and a couple of fire hydrants turned on. Otherwise, everything was reported quiet.

As a result of this blaze, another barn, owned jointly by Bill Robinson and Robert Gallant, 15 Passmore Street, caught fire and received extensive damage. However, articles which were stored in the building were removed before the fire made headway.

The Parkdale Fire brigade was called to Mt. Herbert early Sunday morning where a barn near the orphanage was in flames. A spokesman at the station said the structure could have been set as a Hallowe'en prank.

The barn contained hay which was allowed to burn itself out. A false alarm was investigated by the Sherwood Fire brigade where a member said this was the only call received Saturday evening.

The Charlottetown Detachment of the RCMP had an equally busy night answering a number of calls for damaged property along with investigating three fires and an accident.

A vacant farm house in Millvale, reportedly owned by Knud

Jorgensen of Fredericton, was destroyed by fire Saturday evening. The RCMP are still investigating this incident along with another fire which burned a barn in the Mt.ton area.

A school in the St. Andrews district was badly damaged by fire late Saturday evening. The possibility of vandalism is being investigated, said a member of the RCMP.

No one was injured when an automobile driven by Emmett Murphy of Vernon left the highway near Vernon about 2 p.m. Sunday. The only passenger in the vehicle was the driver's brother.

RCMP said Mr. Murphy lost control of his vehicle.

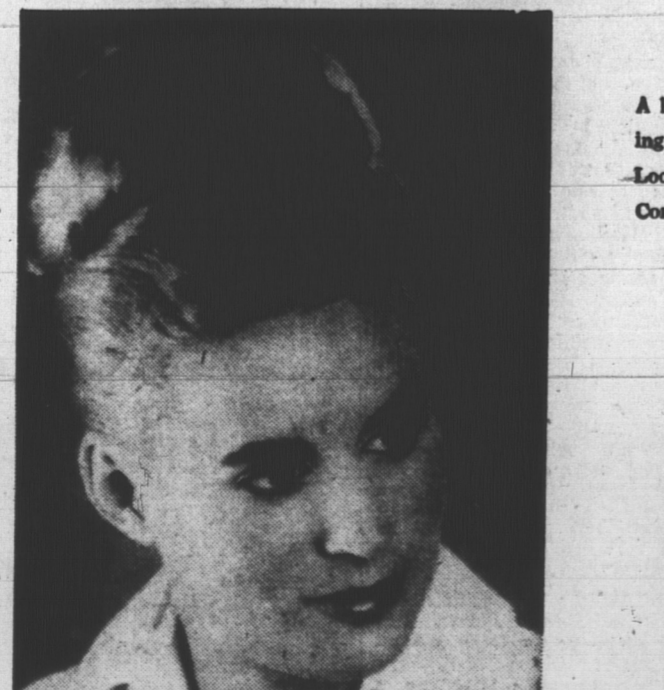
