RECEIVES SAD NEWS - Mrs. R. H. Brittain of 286 Fitzroy St. has received the sad news of the death yesterday, Feb. 26, of her sister, Mrs. Hugh Shields of Halifax. Mrs. Shields, the former Elma Smith of Charlottetown, was 39. Mrs. Thomas Gartham, 75 Upper Queen Street, is another sister.

Friends were shocked to hear of the death in the Prince County Hospital on Wednesday evening of Mr. Sandy McDonald, Tyne Valley. This community extends sympathy to his brother, Pete, and also his sister, Mrs. Ford. His funeral was held on Friday afternoon from the Presbyterian Church.

Friends were sorry to hear of the death of Mr. John McNeil in Charlottetown on Thursday morning, Feb. 9th. Mr. McNeil was a former resident of Tyne Valley. His remains were forwarded to Tyne Valley to Mr. Roy Phillips' home, where a short funeral service was held. Burial was in the Presbyterian cemetery, Freeland.

The death of Mr. Charles Doyle occurred recently at his home in Lowell, Massachusetts, after a short illness. Charles Doyle was born at Tignish sixty-eight years ago, the son of the late Patrick Doyle and Honora Casey Doyle. When still a young man he went to live in the United States, but made regular visits to his native village, where he has a large host of friends who were grieved to hear of his death. He is survived by his widow, one son, three brothers and five sisters. A brother, Mr. Henry Doyle, and a sister, Mrs. Joseph Buote, reside in Tignish. The price and quantity of Island turnips shipped from this Province to date have almost doubled the price and amount of those shipped to the end of February in 1949. It was learned from Mr. W. P. MacLeod, Senior Fruit and Vegetable Inspector here, that approximately 1584 car loads or 1,267,200 bushels of turnips have been shipped this year. During the similar period last year 904 car loads or 723,200 bushels were shipped. The present price of turnips is 60 cents per bushel compared to 39-42 cents this time a year ago.

A small turnip crop in Ontario was given by Mr. MacLeod as one of the reasons why the price and quantity of shipments increased to such an extent. He also felt that there was a better grade of Island turnips going on the market. The majority of the turnips are being shipped to New York and Boston. A few were shipped to Ontario during the early part of the year.

The death occurred at Charlottetown, Mrs. James MacArthur, Green Road, on January 25th, the age of seventy-six. Mrs. MacArthur who had been in failing health the past year, was tenderly cared for by her family, until it became apparent three months ago that she required hospital treatment, where she remained until the above mentioned date, when her noble spirit left for the great beyond.

The death recently of Mrs. Charlotte Tweedy recently, widow of the late Cephas B. Announcement that a high power line from Charlottetown to the Summerside area will be built in 1950 and that a 10,000 horse power installation of generators will provide enough extra power for five more years requirements was made in the speech from the Throne with which His Honour, Lieutenant Governor, A. INJURED IN COLLISION - Mr. J. F. Connolly, director of Town Planning for the Department of Industry and Natural Resources here, received head injuries in the collision of two Canadian National Railway passenger trains Friday night near Drummondville, Quebec. Mr. Connolly's head was cut and the skin broken on one side of his face just below his glasses. He was lying in his berth, his head toward the front of the train, when the collision occurred. The impact hurled him against the end of the berth and knocked him out temporarily. The Scotian and the Maritime Express, two Maritime trains, were the ones involved in the head-on crash which occurred in a blinding snowstorm. So far as is known, Mr. Connolly was the only Island passenger on the train. He arrived home on Sunday night.

The community of Woodstock and surrounding districts were shocked to hear of the death on Sunday evening, Feb. 26, of Mr. John Thomas Dignan in his 76th year. The resolution was passed after he heard Mr. Harold Clay, Senior Livestock Fieldman, state that the Dominion Department would supply North Country rams should the Association breeders bring out a few flocks of ewes from Scotland. Should the importation of the North Country Cheviots become a reality, Mr. Clay pointed out that Island breeders could build up flocks of these sheep which could be crossed with the Oxford ewes in the Province. This practice, he estimated, would give better results as cross breeding rather than line breeding is followed in outstanding sheep breeding countries. demand which exists for wool. It was pointed out that last fall the demand was the highest it had been for some years and at present the demand is well in excess of the supply.

Mr. Dignan was unable to be at the funeral service as he was in Charlottetown comforting his mother who is a patient in the hospital there. For him death was not a conquest but a coronation; not an ending but a new beginning.

He leaves to mourn, besides his wife and son Rev. Leslie, a daughter, Hattie, Mrs. Harry Arbing of Woodstock, and two other sons, Herman at home and Alfred in O'Leary and several brothers, to all of whom sincere sympathy is extended.
