

Civic Elections.

THE poll closed at five o'clock this evening, with the following result—

The gentlemen elect are, therefore, W. E. Dawson, Mayor; Messrs. Morris, Ings, Byrne, Koughan, Blake, Davy, Beer, Lawson, Horne and Smith—Councillors. These gentlemen have succeeded to very grave responsibilities. We trust they will prove themselves equal to the occasion.

The Northwest Territories.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD, in his official report to the Governor General, says the population of the Northwest territories has very greatly increased during the past twelve months, and that the coming season promises results far beyond anything which has so far been experienced. Sir John directs attention to the subject of stock-raising, for which that section of the territories lying along the easterly slopes of the Rocky Mountains is said to offer unusual facilities in the way both of shelter and pasturage, cattle being able to subsist in the open air during the whole winter and being found in good condition in the spring. It is probable, Sir John thinks, that this industry will be further developed by gentlemen of experience in stock-farming, and possessed of large capital, both from Great Britain and the older Provinces. The condition of Her Majesty's subjects in the Northwest territories is, Sir John says, all that could be desired. "With a beautiful climate and a soil unsurpassed anywhere for its fertility and the ease with which it is made available for agricultural purposes, such of them as have taken up land are reaping bountiful crops, and find a ready and profitable market for their surplus productions. Those engaged in trading and other commercial pursuits are able to do so with as much security as if they lived in the centre of civilization, instead of on the, as yet, sparsely peopled plains; and peace, prosperity, and the utmost regard for law and order, reign everywhere."

Mr. Gladstone Apologises.

EVERYONE knows that Mr. Gladstone is rather too free of speech. It is a failing he has. While in Opposition he said that which he should not have said concerning Austria; and received great credit for it. But almost his first official act was, on the compulsion of the Austrian Ambassador, to make a rather humiliating explanation and apology. The following is a copy of the official document, forwarded by Earl Granville, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, to the British Ambassador at Vienna, to be handed to the Austrian Government and published to the world—an official document, the parallel of which, as a contemporary remarks, can not be found in the archives of any nation:—

"When I accepted the task of forming an administration, I resolved, as a Minister, not to repeat or even defend political language regarding more than one foreign power that I used when in a position of greater freedom. I regret that I should ever have seemed to impute to the Emperor of Austria language which he did not use. I have no hostile disposition towards any country; I have always heartily wished well to Austria. In the performance of the arduous task of consolidating the Empire, I feel a cordial respect for the efforts of the Emperor. Respecting my animadversions on the foreign policy of Austria, when it was active beyond the borders, I will not conceal from you that grave apprehensions were excited in my mind, lest Austria should play a part in the Balkan peninsula hostile to the freedom of the emancipated population—and to the reasonable hopes of the subjects of the Sultan. These apprehensions were founded upon secondary evidence, but it was no evidence of hostile witnesses and was the best at my command. You now assure me that Austria does not require to extend or add to the rights she acquired under the Treaty of Berlin. Had I possessed such assurance before, I never would have uttered any word which you describe as painful and wounding, but I will immediately express my serious concern that I should have been led to refer to the transactions of an earlier period or to the use of terms of censure which I can now wholly banish from my mind. I think this explanation should be made not less public than the speech which supplied the occasion thereof. (Signed) W. E. GLADSTONE.

A P. E. Island Girl Dying of Malaria.

Inspector Byrnes, assisted by Detectives Golden and Dusenbury, arrested yesterday Adolph Meyberg and a woman named Annie Norris, alias Mme. Romaine, wife of a policeman of the Ninth precinct, on complaint of Maud Bishop, better known as Maud Battell, sixteen years of age, who alleges that she has been betrayed. She related the following history to Inspector Byrnes:—She became acquainted with a man named Henry Strong on a Boston boat one year ago. He gave her wine to drink; which left her in a helpless condition. She afterwards awoke, she says, to the realization of the fact that she had fallen a victim to his evil designs. Subsequently she made the acquaintance of Meyberg. He visited her frequently at her residence, No. 49 Bond Street, and also at the St. Charles Hotel. Two months ago she persuaded him to accompany her to the house of a female practitioner in Eleventh Street, between Seven and Eight avenues. By the hands of this practitioner she has received serious injury, and is now dying from its effects, in St. Vincent Hospital. The practitioners have been arrested. The girl is said to be the daughter of Wm. E. Bishop, of Prince Edward Island, Canada. She left home three years ago and came to this city, and was employed in Maiden Lane in the manufacture of cosmetics. — N. Y. Herald, 10th inst.

A BOY SHOT.—A boy, named Adams, who has been in the habit of begging, called at the house of W. A. Moore, Woodstock, N. B., when Mrs. Moore tried to frighten him away with a pistol. The servant girl, by the name of Crillen, took the pistol from Mrs. Moore, and fired two or three shots at the lad. One bullet struck him on the right side. Dr. Smith was sent for, but up to the time of writing was not successful in extracting the bullet. The girl has gone to Houlton to avoid being arrested.
