

Light Docket At Georgetown Disposed Of By Magistrate

GEORGETOWN — A relative light docket was disposed of by Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, Jr. at Georgetown yesterday. Due to the absence of the Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGinnis, no evidence was taken in any contested cases before the court.

Arthur Joseph Gallant of Georgetown was remanded in custody to Aug. 1 on a charge of breaking and entering a dwelling house of Hibbett Jenkins, Georgetown with intent to commit an indictable offence. The accused elected trial by magistrate and pleaded not guilty. He is represented by S. S. Heslian. Q.C. Bail was set at an earlier sitting of the court at \$2,900 with two sureties of \$1,000 each.
