We cannot conclude this short notice without adding our testimony to the great merit of Mr. Irving as a water colour artist, and we think some of his beautiful productions, more especially the Monk, worthy of a leading place amongst British artists.

Mrs. Irving also showed us a very fair painting in oil, of the infant Samuel, life-size, done by herself, which is deserving of all praise for truthfulness of delineation and fineness of colour. There is also a perfect little gem of the infant Christ, after Murillo, of which we cannot speak too highly.

CATHOLIC YOUNG MEN'S LITERARY INSTITUTE.—On Thursday evening last, Mr. EDWARD ROCHE, in the absence of William Murphy, Esq.,—being indisposed—very kindly came forward to "fill up the gap" thus occasioned, and delivered a highly instructive lecture on "Optics," being the second of a series on popular science. Scientific Lectures, whatever be their intrinsic worth, without being illustrated by diagrams or experiments with apparatus, are seldom appreciated. However, on this occasion Mr. Roche was listened to with much attention by the audience, and, if such be taken as a criterion, it must certainly be admitted that Mr. Roche's efforts were appreciated. After the lecture a discussion ensued. Some questions proposed to the lecturer were satisfactorily answered, showing that Mr. Roche was master of his subject.—Com.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER.

SIR:—I observe in a No. of your paper a report of a Lecture, which was delivered in Edlington (Bay Fortune) School-house, on the 4th of last month, which I regret being under the necessity of saying, is not wholly correct; and I take the liberty, though with the utmost reluctance, of pointing out and correcting the errors which it contains.

It says that the inferences respecting the wisdom of the Chinese were drawn from a comparison of their customs and institutions with those of Europeans. I deny that these inferences were drawn from such a comparison. It was from a comparison of the stage of progress to which the Chinese had arrived about 600 or 700 years ago, with that to which the Europeans had arrived at the same time, that the lecturer said he was of opinion that the former were a naturally wiser people. The Chinese institutions were referred to, when speaking of the stage of civilization to which they are admitted to have arrived; and their customs were spoken of mostly on account of their contrariety to those of western nations.

In saying that the inferences were rebutted by Rev. Mr. Crawford and others, the Corresponding Secretary's memory seems to have forsaken him a little. Does he remember that the reason given for the want of progress, for a great length of time, on the part of the Chinese, was admitted by Mr. Crawford, and not "rebutted" by the "others"? "The brig, Brothers, from Quebec, but owned by the subscriber, at Bonaventure, Bay Chaleur, broke from her moorings and went adrift from New Richmond, on Wednesday night last, 22d inst., and when last seen in the Bay was passing about 30 miles below Bathurst. From the prevalence of Westerly winds it is supposed she would go into the Gulf. Any information respecting said vessel will be thankfully received by a much distressed man."

On Friday evening and Saturday morning last we ourselves, being at the East Point, saw her drifting with the tide amid "regions of thick-ribbed ice," about five miles from the shore, apparently uninjured.—Ed. Arrivals in Europe from hence.

Bideford, Nov. 29.—Garland, Hallman, from Port Hill. Bristol December 4.—Royal Bride, 8th—Sauldner. Gravesend, December 4.—Nantheit, Thelus. DEPARTURES AT SEA.—The Malakoff (Dart), of P. E. Island, which passed up Channel for Gloucester, has had a very heavy passage of 44 days, with gales the whole of the time. On the 28th of October, lat. 42 41 N., lon. 52 47 W., while a strong sea was raging, took the captain and the crew off the side of the Watersprite, of Whitehaven, from Quebec for Tenby, which tarsus had been dismantled and waterlogged, and was captured three days and three nights, and the crew had nothing to subsist on during the whole of that period, with the sea making breaches over them, but on one and one trip, which were divided into small parts at intervals. Their existence and escape are most miraculous. On the 31st October the Malakoff took another ship's crew (13 in number) of the William Metcalf, of North Shields, which barque had become waterlogged on the 29th, and the crew had subsisted on about 15 lbs of damaged bread the whole of the 11 days, with no water; the captain (James Cuthbertson) and one man washed overboard and lost previously.—Liverpool Paper, Dec. 11.

Wankworth, Dec. 5.—The Mary, Dancy, of and from P. E. Island, for Newcastle, with timber, ran ashore in thick weather last night on the rocks near Hovick, is badly bilged, her masts having gone over her sides, and from the bad position she is in and the strong sea, it is feared she will become a wreck; cargo expected to be saved.
