her to date much until she was 16. Since then she feels her love life is her own business and that we, her parents, have no right to "interfere."

She contends that the family background of boy friends doesn't matter, that one marries the person, not the family. But we say that background shapes the person, also, that it makes a difference in what people think.

Of recent months she is dating a boy whom we deplore. His mother, for example, refers coarsely and candidly to the father's most intimate health history and also brings to associations about her son's dating our daughter, a prospective "good catch" in their eyes, evidently.

How do you get across to kids, who can't or won't look beyond the end of their nose, that we parents aren't trying to keep them from marriage, as they may think, but are interested in helping them make a fortunate choice, as a whole lifetime is at stake. That's why we want them to take counsel from parents and other seasoned sources of guidance.

I've consulted our pastor, telling him exactly what I've told you, and he agrees decisively that we are justified in opposing the current romance. What are we to do, we parents who care enough to get involved? D.B.

Dear D.B.: The gist of your letter, here condensed, suggests that your daughter may feel that she is over-valued by her parents, as compared to the value she puts upon herself, or as compared to the truth, as she sees it, of her personal rating with contemporaries in the dating area.

That may be one major reason why she fights your effort to play an administrative role in respect to her beaux, and your manifest wish to weed out all except good marriage prospects of good background; and your further desire to keep even the best of those from establishing a steady dating option on her interest at present.

Your daughter may feel, fiercely, in a vaguely threatened way, that your whole concept of the dating situation (as she knows it), is totally unrealistic. She may feel that she is doing the best she can in the circumstances, to stay afloat socially, in the world of her contemporaries, while you stand by criticizing, thus diminishing her chances of doing any better.

Or, on the other hand, her hostile, disloyal pitch — as in openly downgrading you to her friends when your authoritative views displease her — this jarring attitude, anything but admirable in a grown daughter, could be a bitter fruit of your having loved her too fulsomely, "not wisely but too well," as the phrase is, during her formative years.

You mention being very proud of her, principally, it seems, because she makes a hit with outsiders. Which is getting the cart before the horse, surely, in respect to sound values, behavior-wise.

The nub of your problem with your daughter may be that she dislikes and rejects you to a degree, going contrary to your hopes, in a spirit of contempt, as mixed-up, ego-inflated youngsters will, whose dot in g parents foolishly look up to them, psychologically, on the tacit theory that the youngsters are potentially superior to the parents, due to greater exposure to more opportunities than the parents had in youth.

Children thus "spoiled" sense the innate personal insecurity implicit in the parents' fawning regard, and tend to resent and despise the parents, unconsciously, for trying (as it seems) to live vicariously through them, at a supposedly higher level of experience. My advice is: get firsthand family relations counselling help, in discovering how to wear yourself, appropriately, from undue preoccupation with your daughter's choices - of action. M.H.
