TRAVEL ON THE INTERCOLONIAL.—Passengers who have recently passed over the Intercolonial report that the passenger traffic this summer is simply immense. Tourists on their way to the principal resorts, frequently monopolize an entire car of a single train. Large numbers pass over the Nova Scotia end to Cape Breton, which is increasing in popularity as a pleasure resort. The number going to Prince Edward Island are also greatly in excess of previous years.—*Moncton Times*.

CALL it bribery or expenses, or what you will, the cost of becoming a member of the British Parliament is frightful to contemplate. Mr. Courtney, a member of the House, and one of the leader-writers of the *London Times* has been computing the cost of the last general election, with the following results:—The cost for the city of London was \$75,000; Greenwich, over \$50,000; Southwark, \$75,000; South Essex, \$100,000; Middlesex, \$60,000; Montgomeryshire, \$100,000. Here is \$970,000 among some half-dozen constituencies, after all the reforms of the past fifty years! And Mr. Courtney remarks that unfortunately it has become so evident that in many cases the official return of expenditure represents but a portion of it.

THE DEAF AND DUMB DEPUTATION.—Mr. Woodbridge and his pupils met with a very kind reception at Alberton on Thursday. The Rev. A. F. Carr presided at the meeting, which was held in the church. A liberal collection was taken up at the close. The Rev. Mr. Patterson entertained the deputation at Bedouque on the Saturday following. The weather was stormy, and this prevented many from being at the meeting who had expressed sympathy with the cause. On Monday last a meeting was held at Alberton, and the deputation was entertained at Mount Stewart by the Rev. E. W. Frame. There was a full attendance at the meeting, which was held in the Fall, and many gave in their names as subscribers to the institution.

MR. JAMES A. DAVISON, of Cow Bay, Nova Scotia, has patented an improvement in instruments for sea-sounding, by which the depth of water is read from a graduated scale upon the instrument, instead of by the length of the line. By this invention soundings can be taken while the sailing vessel or steamship is in motion as quickly as if the ship were at rest. The principle upon which the depth is by the weight being equalized, the depth is by the air and the power of a spring. The indicator is provided with a heavy end, which keeps it upright in its descent, and confine the air, which becomes compressed until an equilibrium is found, and at that moment a spring closes a valve and stops the admission of water so that if the indicator becomes inverted or falls horizontally the air cannot escape or take in water.—*Scientific American*.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN. YARMOUTH, N. S., Aug. 23. The proceedings of the Baptist Convention yesterday were intensely interesting and there were large numbers in attendance at all the sessions; the evening meeting lasted until midnight. The discussion of foreign mission matters in connexion with the Foreign Mission Board and Missionary Armstrong finally terminated by passing the resolution of Rev. W. H. Marvin and Dr. Day; deciding that the confidence of the denomination in their Board was unshaken, and that Rev. W. F. Armstrong and wife should be earnestly requested to return to the Chicaco mission as soon as possible.

The committee on statistics reported that the total membership of the Baptist Churches in the Maritime Provinces was, in June 1881, 37,003, showing a Baptist population of about 140,000.

To-day has been occupied by reports of the Home Missions, Acadia College, etc. Eight hundred dollars was given at one of the sessions, to-day, to the Home Mission Fund.

The report of the finance committee was presented showing the convention to have attained a large increase in the last year. The total amount contributed is \$11,000 for the various objects of benevolence in connection with the body, the home and foreign missions being the principal ones.

This evening an educational meeting will be held, and will be addressed by all the leading educationalists belonging to the Convention.

UNITED STATES. SANTA FE, Aug. 23. The following is an account of the fight a few days ago: Lieut. Smith and twenty men overtook the Indians in the Lake Valley district. The Indians were strong in numbers, and Smith attacked them, expecting reinforcements from troops following some distance behind. The soldiers were being rapidly shot down, when George Daly, with twenty miners, arrived and joined in the fight, and the Indians were routed with great loss. They, however, carried off their dead and wounded, so that the exact loss could not be ascertained. The whites lost George Daly, Lieut. Smith, and four men killed and eleven wounded. Except Daly, all are supposed to be ex-soldiers. Lieut. Dimmick with a company of cavalry, and Lieut. Taylor, with twenty Indian scouts, who were but a few hours behind the miners' main band, arrived during the evening and continued the pursuit. Probably they have overtaken the Indians who are making for Chihuahua.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23. Official bulletin.—The President slept the greater part of the night, but awoke at frequent intervals. He has taken since last evening a larger quantity of liquid food by the mouth than in the corresponding hours of any day during the past week. The use of nutrient enemata is continued at longer intervals. The parotid swelling is unchanged. Pulse, 100; temperature 98.4; respiration 18.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23. Steamer *Erin* reports speaking steamer *Persian Monarch* on the 19th, under sail, making for this port, her propeller being broken. The weather was fine and she wanted no assistance. She sailed from here Aug. 16th and eleven passengers. She expects to reach this port in the latter part of this week.

EUROPEAN. MADRID, Aug. 22. The notables not elected to the Cortes are: Ruiz, Sorilla and Sal Meron, who are in voluntary exile. They received many votes, however, in Madrid and other districts.

Sagasta, Minister of Interior; Martinez Campos, Minister of War, have been elected to the Cortes. O'Leary was successful at Barcelona. Sufficient is known of the general results to see that the congress will consist of 230, more or less, followers of the Premier Sagasta, the nearest to whom will sit with Gatastalar, with 14 moderate Republicans and 9 independent Democrats, with Moret and Montro Ruiz, both groups being always ready to combine with the Cabinet against the advanced Radicals, numbering under Mates Ruiz and Zorilla, or even against Senor Carovasal Castillo and his 35 Conservatives.

LONDON, Aug. 23. Mr. Mason will represent America at the forthcoming Chess Congress at Berlin.

VIENNA, Aug. 23. Baron Mayer, Austrian Minister at Washington, at present here, is about to tender his resignation on account of ill health.

I do hereby give public notice that an Election of Three Persons to constitute a Licensing Board for the City of Charlottetown, will be held on

TUESDAY! the 6th day of September, A.D. 1881,

at the several places following, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1—At or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2—At or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heartz's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3—At or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4—At or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, (east) between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets.

In Ward No. 5—At or near the house of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Euston Streets.
