DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Budget Speech.

AN EXCELLENT SHOWING.

Some Tariff Changes.

OTTAWA, June 24.

The Budget Speech was delivered yesterday. It was pronounced to be the most satisfactory in the history of the Dominion. The financial review showed that the business of the country was in an exceedingly healthy state. Hon. Mr. Foster referred to the establishment of the steamship lines to the West Indies and to the satisfactory results which have followed. He also referred to the establishment of the fast service on the Pacific Ocean. He explained the circumstances which had postponed the fast Atlantic service authorized by parliament. He said the McKinley bill had proved less harmful than was feared, and that great possibilities existed in the British market for eggs, poultry and live stock. He had held hopes for beneficial trade compact with the West Indies. But the United States had got ahead of Canada. He referred to the reciprocity negotiations, and said Canada would treat on fair terms for whatever freedom of trade compatible with the best interests of both countries. He proved that his statement of last year that the revenues would equal the total capital and ordinary expenditure, although ridiculed by the Opposition, had been realized within three thousand dollars. The debt had not increased and the net rate of interest had decreased eight cents, standing at the lowest point ever reached. The interest paid per head of population, which is the true measure of the burden of debt on the country, was now only six cents more than in 1879, before the C. P. R. was commenced or any other vast expenditures undertaken. For the current year he anticipated a surplus over ordinary expenditure of over two millions. The government proposes to sweep away the duty on raw sugar and reduce the duty on refined sugar, thus wiping out three millions and one half of taxation. To make up for this they propose to economize to the extent of two millions and to raise a million and a half by increased duty of liquors and tobacco, they propose one cent extra on malt, twenty cents excise duty on distilled spirits, and five cents a pound excise and five cents on import tobacco. Beet root sugar is to receive a bounty for this year only. Cartwright replied in a blue rain speech, and moved an amendment in favor of reciprocity with the United States in both natural and manufactured products.

An Act amending the Act respecting the practice of medicine and surgery was read a first time and made the order of the day for second reading to-morrow. Mr. Warburton submitted a bill authorizing the sale of the plot of land in Charlottetown, formerly owned by the late Hon. Edward Whelan. Referred to Private Bills Committee.

The act amending the act respecting investment of moneys in the Court of Chancery, was read a third time and passed. Hon. Mr. Peters, from the Expiring Laws Committee, reported that there were no laws expiring this year. Laid on table. House adjourned.
